24th January: There was a good attendance at the meeting of the Social Club where we were welcomed by Dorothy. Very little business time was needed but before our speaker for the afternoon was introduced Joan gave a vote of thanks to Karen who had organised

for our members to go to the film 'Mrs. Harrris goes to Paris' in the Flavel and for us to all have lunch together in the Flavel Café. This was a very enjoyable event and we are all keen to go to the next morning when a new film will be shown.

Our speaker Dannielle Brien, a resident

of this village, was introduced and spoke to us on the 'Secrets of Shopping'. Danielle before her retirement had run a business for 14 years into shopper research. She had dealt with all aspects of shopping dealing with many large companies like coca cola. Another branch was to give advice to supermarkets, researching where it was best to place products, their packaging etc. We learned that the best place to display a prod-



uct is at eye level, the top being for more expensive items and the lower down items are displayed usually means the cheaper lines. She told us of how garage forecourts came to have a well-known supermarket alongside their garages and of the way the Petrol company fitted in with M & S which was the one she was illustrating to us even down to the Petrol companies staff dressing in the uniform of the supermarket. One supermarket came up with the idea for ready meals for 70–85-year-old but got it all wrong cutting the portions small as they said 'Old people didn't eat much'. This item never got past the development stage and never reached the supermarket.

Nowadays men are one third of shoppers. They shop in a very different way on the whole to women, women tend to browse, men go direct for what they want and their shopping is done. We learnt such a lot this afternoon and Danni was thanked by Karen after she had answered a few questions that members put to her.

Our usual social time was then had when we were served with tea by Carol and Chris.

Strete Social Club 7th February. A warm welcome was extended to members and two guests at our meeting when the

usual business was dealt with, in which our Treasurer informed us that to date we have twenty-one paid up members.

Our speaker for the afternoon, Peter Barker, was introduced and he gave us a talk on his recent trip to Nepal.

Seeing an advert come up on his computer and offering many of the things that are of interest to him like seeing the Himalayas, boat trip, visit to schools, Trekking, booked and set off with a small party to partake of this holiday.



Two guides led the party of 15 and with the aid of slides Peter took us on a tour of Nepal.

The mountains were hidden in cloud but did eventually clear so that he had great views of these. We then joined him on a Trek in the hills where the party were taken to a school where they were given a great welcome and presented with a scarf and hat which he modelled for us. The children were delightful but the facilities were very sparce. A Jungle trip was much enjoyed. He then put up a map of Nepal and pointed out various places including Katmandoo where he paid a visit. One hundred and twenty-three languages are spoken in Nepal. 45% speak the native tongue. Hindu is widely spoken. He had a trip in a small plane over Mount Everest. The roads were quite rough with lots of scooters and motor bikes. Alongside the road were shacks where the people lived and, in the slides, you could see the occupants doing various tasks through the open doors. In Katmandoo there were bikes strewed everywhere. We saw many slides of temples in which were statues of elephants and Lions, Royal palaces.

They have rice paddy fields. The food he said was delicious especially the soup and the omelettes that were a breakfast food. It was very good to visit the area where the Gurkhas trained. There was a school there which the party also visited. There was a parade with the band playing to welcome them to the area with dancing and speeches as they wound their way through the streets.

Peter then touched on the various religions and finished his talk with a few slides on the animals, elephants, monkeys and they were so lucky to see a tiger.

He was thanked by Brenda and tea was served by Sandy and Joan Kendall.

Strete Social Club 21st February: There was a good attendance at our meeting on 21st February when we had a speaker.

Christine Paradine, from Animals in Distress. Christine was the Manager of the centre at Ipplepen and is now a Trustee of the Charity. She also helps with being a dog walker.

She assured us that it was not going to be a sad afternoon and began her illustrated talk by saying that they rehome about 400 animals per year.

It all began in 1981 with three ladies who took in an animal when the owner had to go into hospital and Is in Distress from there it snowballed. When this got too large for their home they used kennels which of course were expensive and then they ventured into opening a centre in Ipplepen. This was officially opened by John Inman, who gave his services free, when appearing in a show in Torquay.

Each animal is vaccinated and chipped. Vet's fees are around £150,000 per annum. They have a volunteer who goes to do home checks when an animal is about to go to a new home. Just to see that it is a suitable place for the animal to live and to check what the prospective adopters have told them is true. One instance she quoted was it was said that they had a secure garden. On checking it was a block of flats with a communal outdoor space.

Helping the homeless pets of South Devon

Caring for and rehoming over 600 homeless, lost and abandoned cats, dogs, rabbits and guinea pigs every year.

There are seven charity shops in our area and these are a life line at raising money, also they rely on legacies. Fund raising is carried out with many varying things from coffee mornings to sky diving, mud wallowing, dog shows etc.

In 2012 they built their own veterinary surgery which is a great asset with the vet and nurse able to carry out injections, treatment and microchipping on the site. Saving time and stress to both staff and animals.

Some of the dogs that have come into the centre have gone on to achieve great things, Two examples were told. One a dog called Diesel who

saved his owner and parents by alerting them to their house being on fire. This dog was awarded the highest honour for animals and a photo was shown of him wearing the medal, our human equivalent of the George Cross. Another springer cross cocker spaniel named Pepper, was taken on by the police and this dog after training is now working to go over venues where the Royal family are due to go to functions, checking for bombs etc.

Dorothy thanked Christine for a very interesting and informative talk. The social club gave her a fee for her talk and a collection box on the table received donations from the members.



7th March: A warm welcome awaited us as we went to the village hall for our Social Club Meeting. Karen read out a letter of thanks from Animals in distress for our donation and money raised in their collection box when a member of their team spoke to us last week. Dorothy dealt with the little business that we had and then our speaker, Juliet an artist who lives in the village, spoke of how she came to do watercolour painting. As a child she won a competition and had her painting hung in an art gallery. She was busy throughout her life and didn't have so much time to enjoy her art but then she was farming and did find time to take up watercolour painting once again. She had brought along a variety of paintings and explained to us the different techniques that were used to created various effects. She has started teaching art locally to small groups and is in charge of the paintings which are displayed in our village pub The Kings Arms, by different local artists which of course are using different materials. These can be purchased.

After questions were answered Juliet was thanked by Dorothy and we were informed that her fee was to be donated to the Red Cross.

Tea and biscuits were served by Shirley and Rita.



Strete Social Club 21st March: Our speaker for the afternoon really needed no introduction as it was Sally Green who for

many years was a reader in the village Church of St. Michaels.

She began her talk by saying that she had divided it up into three parts. The first part up to the first 28 years of her life. The second part was of her 4 years in New Zealand and the third part of the 17 years she spent as a Missionary in the nursing profession in Papua New Guinea

She was not born in Devon but lived in Bromley Kent 1939 for five years in which time due to the war was evacuated to Oxfordshire with her sister and Mum, her father staying behind. Sally attended school here. In 1943 they moved back to London where she went to high school. When it got dangerous to stay her father and mother stayed but sent the two girls to Dawlish, in Devon. When Sally left school, she decided to take up nursing aged 19. Her first posting was at the Middlesex Hospital doing Midwifery.

After a while her and two friends decided they wanted some adventure and would go to New Zealand. The other two friends got married and never went but Sally sailed on her own and finished in Auckland where she trained other midwives. Along with friends she had made over in N.Z. they decided to go and work on a fruit farm where it was owned by a great Christian family and it was here that her Faith was renewed. After 3 very enjoyable years so went back to nursing. She became a Missionary and was posted to Papua New Guinea. Part three of her life was then spent in P.N.G. which is the second largest island in the world. Here she worked in ten different places and again trained midwives and had to deal with many of the tropical diseases. Life was not easy as the nearest Doctor was a very long way away and it was a long journey to take seriously ill patients to see him. If she knew there was likely to be complications in childbirth they would journey to the big hospital again many many miles away as they could not deal with such cases in the villages. She also visited many outlying places, having to walk to these with a medical support and deal with many illnesses and giving vaccinations etc.

One question asked was if she had ever done a caesarean or amputation. No was the answer but she did sew a finger back on.

She had brought along many items from P.N.G. made by the local people and these were passed around along with some very lovely photos of the facilities and staff who she had trained. A very interesting talk which Karen



thanked her for. We then had our usual cups of tea and this week buns. The tables had table cloths on which Sally had brought and related to P.N.G.



The Friday Bar Night Draw was greeted with much anticipation and last minute decisions to purchase a number for the draw. For the first draw 40 of the 50 numbers available were purchased before all 50 were entered into the draw box.

The draw coincided with a children's event at the Village Hall that finished at 7pm and resulted in a number of parents making the most of the opportunity to enjoy time together in the pub before going home. The pub enjoyed their company that generated a buzz of chat and laughter. A great way to spend a Friday evening.

One lucky number was drawn from the draw box for the £50 voucher to spend in the Kings Arms and, fortunately, the owner of the number was in the bar to collect the voucher. Each number costs £5 and is a one-off purchase which means it's in the draw box each week with a chance to win a £50 voucher. The voucher must be used within two months of winning it. If the person who bought the winning number is not in the bar at the time of the draw, it's a roll-over to the following week and £10 is added to the draw. This continues each week until there is a winner in the bar.

The voucher value is capped at £100. Importantly, customers who have bought a number must be in the bar between 6 and 8pm on a Friday to see their number drawn from the box to win the voucher.

The motivation is to encourage people to visit the Kings Arms for a couple of hours to communicate with each other about anything and everything. It could also provide an opportunity to find out what the community would like to see the pub doing that could encourage them use the Kings Arms more frequently as a community pub.

I understand that the Strete Estate will be a family run venture. Would you like to introduce everyone involved?

Nigel & Tracey Spokes (father & mother) Warren & Brendan Spokes (sons) Warren is married to Grace and they have 3 daughters - Aspen (4), Blake (2) and Rae (newborn) Brendan's partner is Kasope

It is early days, but do you think some of the family will end up living in the area?

Brendan is already living in Firstfield, Hynetown Road in Strete and encourages anyone to pop round for a tea or coffee if they'd like to introduce themselves.

What attracted the family to choose Strete above other farms in the south West?

INCA THE VULTURE

Running out of her carrying box, Inca our Black Vulture with her wings spread lolloped down the hill at Pennywell Farm and took off on a



training flight. Up and up circulating as she went higher and higher, catching a thermal until she was just a dot above us. Karen the Falconer produced her lure which had bait attached to the leather dummy mouse at the end and threw it to the ground in front of her, instead of an instant reaction from Inca the opposite happened, and she started to drift

off towards distant Dartmoor until she disappeared altogether. We waited and waited for her to turn and stoop for her food as she was trained to do. But no, she must have caught a thermal and found it difficult to turn back to Pennywell.

We spent the rest of the day at the Falconry Centre in expectation that she would find her way home, but it was not to be, and we returned home to Totnes fretting about the loss of our very valuable bird.

I tumbled into Falconry after meeting Karen, she had an interest in 'Birds of Prey' and kept a Kestrel and Buzzard in two aviaries at her Totnes home, something I had no knowledge of but was soon to take over my life.

It all kicked off at 'The Shire Horse Centre' near Plymouth where Karen deputised for the resident Falconer one weekend, and found she had a knack for it. Then followed Woodlands Falconry Centre, then Pennywell Farm rebuilding the disused Falconry Centre and making a success of it. Also, over the next eight years calling ourselves 'Saker Falconry' then

'Devon Country Pursuits' we demonstrated at the Royal Cornwall Show, the Devon County Show and most of the smaller County Shows throughout Devon, Dorset and Cornwall. We then set up a bird clearance section assisting places such as Teignbridge docks and local schools to get rid of seagulls and pigeons by flying a Harris Hawk, and Eagle Owl. We also held a contract to



keep seagulls from attacking their reflections on the Biomes at the Eden

Project for several years, flying a Peregrine Falcon and Harris Hawk above them.

Meanwhile back to our escapee, Inca the Black Vulture. Hoping she



would have found her way back her aviary at Pennywell Farm we set out early the next morning, but no, she was nowhere to be seen despite lots of food being thrown to the ground to entice her from any of the nearby trees. And then we turned to the obvious, the media, Black Vultures are never seen in our skies and their outline is so different to our native birds, so

we contacted the newspapers and TV Channels hoping she would be spotted. And she was, from Dartmoor westwards towards Cornwall, then all went quite for two weeks. Then we received a phone call.

"I believe you have lost a Black Vulture" the man said on the other end of the phone, "I have read about it in the Western Morning News and think it has taken up residence in my barn do you want to come and collect her?" "Yes please", Karen said, "where are you"? "Well, it's a bit difficult" the man said, "I am in the back woods of mid-Cornwall and I will have to give you directions to the nearest town, then you will have to ring me from there." Now in the year 2000 we didn't have Smart Phones only phones like the Nokia and Razor often with dodgy signals, however we made the town and were lucky enough to get a decent signal and further directions. Very strange we thought, why all the secrecy, it would have been easier to have had an address and looked it up on the map as we went.

Eventually we neared the property in the deepest countryside and strangely as we approached saw it was surrounded by a tall wired fence with large cameras mounted on tall poles looking like a secret military establishment. Only it wasn't a military establishment but just a normal farmhouse surrounded by barns. We rang the number again and the gate opened for us to approach the house.

"Your bird is in this barn at the moment", said the nice slightly built man that greeted us, "she has been with us for nearly a week on the top of the barn but lately has been living inside", quietly we looked in and saw that indeed it was Inca our missing Vulture. So now we had to get her out. We had with us her large Carrying Box and a huge net to do the job, and boy it was one hell of a job. After several attempts by Karen to temp him down with food it was up to

me to dive in armed with the net to try and catch a large American Black Vulture with a vicious looking large beak.

I will not go into details about the 15 minutes I spent in that barn with the doors shut, I shall that leave that to the readers imagination. I emerged covered in straw, dirt, scratched and bloodied with one Black Vulture in her box. The spectators outside said the sound effects coming from that barn was to be believed.

"Come in for a cuppa', said the barn owner "and meet my wife, I have also got a request to ask of you". So, after a chat, tea and cake, he apologised for the secrecy surrounding our visit and asked if we could keep the visit and location to ourselves, of course we said, no problem. "I will tell you why" he said.


It turned out that our Black Vulture had chosen out of all the buildings in the West Country to make her home in the barn of a wanted man. A few days later Inca became very ill and we had to take her all the way to Andover to see a specialist Vet who diagnosed that she had possibly eaten a dead rat that had been poisoned in the SAS soldiers barn, thankfully she made a full recovery.

Inca is still alive and can be seen at the Devon Bird of Prey Centre at Fermoy's Garden Centre, Karen the Falconer will be very pleased to see you.

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Update from the PPG meeting held on 22 February 2023 Paul Green

A meeting of the Dart Medical Practice Patients Participation Group was held on the evening of 22 February 2023. Several key points discussed at the meeting.

Practice move to the HWBC

The move to the HWBC (Health and Wellbeing Centre) has been delayed.

Moving over Easter as previously planned isn't possible as the facility will not formally open until 9 May. The Dartmouth Clinic will move to the HWBC from that date. The GP surgery is planning to move over the Spring bank holiday weekend at the end of May. Dates earmarked for the move are Saturday 27 – Monday 29 May.



Issues are around the HWBC

Two issues the PPG want addressed prior to the move were discussed.

The path that has been built to provide direct access from the bus stop and Sainsburys isn't fit for purpose. The current path is narrow and has a rough gravel surface. This makes it difficult to use both for people with reduced mobility or families with children in prams or pushchairs. Also, the path lacks basic safety precautions as there is no barrier at the end of the path to prevent people going straight onto the road.

Charges for using the car park are still to be resolved. The PPG believes that the first 30 minutes should be free with a minimum charge being made for the first hour. This will facilitate people using the surgery and picking up prescriptions from the pharmacy.

Both the issues will be taken up with the relevant people.

Bookable appointments on Saturdays

These are now up and running. Saturday appointments need to be booked in advance and take place at the Leatside surgery in Totnes. The implementation of the new computer system in the Dart Medical Practice means that patient notes will be available to support appointments at Leatside.

Patient Survey

News from Blackawton & Strete History group (BASH)

As you probably know, Strete and Blackawton were a single civil parish until 1935. From time-to-time BASH is

given old documents which may refer to either, as they have such a long, shared, history as a single parish.

A while ago BASH was given a set of old parchments which are conveyances and indentures relating to Oldstone House, now a ruin but formerly a grand house belonging to the Dimes family, who owned a lot of land in what is now Blackawton parish. The documents date back to the early 1800s and have now been transcribed. BASH is now going to deposit the originals in the South West Heritage Centre (formerly the Devon Record Office) in Exeter so that they can be held securely and maintained in perfect condition. The originals will be made available if you visit.

In future it may be possible to alter the website so that old documents can be posted directly. However, as BASH is in the doldrums and there has been little activity since the pandemic, we need to bring it to life again before undertaking any website work. 

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

Re-introduce water voles to the River Gara and its tributaries.

Water voles are a keystone species that have a disproportionately positive effect on their environment relative to their numbers. They make a dynamic habitat that supports lots of other species and are vital to maintain abundant wetland ecosystems along riverbanks.

As the water voles chew down the vegetation, they create flower rich banks with greatly increased plant diversity and this benefits many different species including butterflies, bees, moths and other pollinators. That then creates more food for the birds, mammals and bats that eat those insects. Many other small mammals, reptiles, and amphibians use water vole burrows for refuge and as places to breed and of course the water voles themselves are food for larger creatures like otters, stoats and herons.

Why have all the water voles disappeared?


The water vole has been a feature of our countryside for over 10,000 years. In the early 1900s over 8 million were recorded in Britain, but these charismatic and ecologically important little animals have largely disappeared from our waterways. It is estimated that we now have less than 100,000 left, reflecting a 90% decline just in the



last two decades. Water voles have now been classified as endangered and by 2020 were functionally extinct in Devon and Cornwall.

The rapid drop in water vole numbers was caused by many things, but the three main causes are habitat loss, predation by feral American mink and pollution. This decrease in their populations has then impacted other species that depend on them.

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

www.strete.org.uk MINUTES OF A MEETING OF STRETE PARISH COUNCIL (PC) HELD AT STRETE PARISH HALL ON THURSDAY 16TH FEBRUARY 2023 AT 7PM

PRESENT: Cllr Peter Hales (PH) Chair, Cllr Ralph Clark(RC), Cllr Kate Gill (KG), Cllr Ian Cumberlidge (IC), Cllr Graham Campbell (GC), Cllr David Rothwell (DR), Cllr Louise Newman (LN), County Cllr Julian Brazil (JB), District Cllr Richard Foss (RF).

PUBLIC FORUM

2 members of the public attended, Maureen and Paddy Fanning to give their opinions on a planning application.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT: JB reported that the County Council had increased the budget by 5%. At this stage it was difficult to see where actual cuts had taken place.

JB suggested that the mood of the council had changed towards Highways and local issues.

Report that Stagecoach is pulling out of the 93 bus contract. The situation will be reviewed by the Transport Committee.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT: RF reported that the South Hams DC Budget increase had been set at 5%.

There is a long-term problem with the capacity of water supply resources in the area.

There are 7 Planning Enforcement Officers but they struggle to keep up with very difficult cases in the area.

RF is going to check on the new grant process for new funding for small businesses which is imminent.

RF reported a serious problem in attracting new younger councillors.

There is a new South Hams DC Tree officer.

Reported that work has been done by Landmark on the Slapton Line and that work has been done on the centre car park, without the knowledge of local councillors.

APOLOGIES None received.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING held on 19th January 2023.

These were agreed and signed by the Chair, PH.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

None were made.

PLANNING AND PLANNING MATTERS

0124/23/HHO Mr P. Burgoyne 36 Start Bay Park TQ6 0RY

This application was supported. RC to write to South Hams DC.

0057/23/LBC & 0058/23/HHO Mrs Victoria Crane Glen Cottage Strete TQ6 0RW

The PC had objected to the previous application due to its effect on a listed building in a conservation area under SNP2. The PC had also objected to overlooking of the neighbour's garden and loss of privacy. Despite some alterations to the plans, the PC's objections remained the same and both applications will be formally objected to. RC to write to South Hams DC. **MEETING WITH SPOKES FAMILY:** PH reported on a very positive friendly meeting with the Spokes family, who are the new owners of the Strete Estate.

PH and RC had positive introductory discussions regarding various land use issues of interest to the PC, including the Playpark, a possible Air Ambulance site, a composting site and potential building site on Cox's Farm land. The suggestion had been made that the Spokes family be introduced to the village via an article in the village magazine Stretewise.

PARISH COUNCIL TARGETS FOR 2023

No new information on these targets.

FINANCE: Cheques were approved and signed as per the agenda. Two additional cheques were also raised, one for John Gilbert to cover hedgecutting in the village (£516.00) and one for Dash (UK) Ltd to cover the procurement of 60 Coronation Bone China mugs for Parish children (£424.80). This latter cost will be offset by a grant from the Ward Member's localities fund. RF was thanked for this. Monitoring of 2022/23 year to February 2023 held over until new RFO available.

Cash at bank – Balance of £14536.79 available in current account. £11,341.97 available in Reserve account. All as at 31/1/23.

It was clear that the end of the year situation is very difficult in the absence of a clerk. There is also the need for a new auditor. PH and RC to contact Shams DC to discuss the situation with them and discover what legally has to happen. PH will also enquire if Shams can carry out the annual audit. The former Clerk has offered to help draw up the end of year accounts, an offer which has been gratefully accepted. It is noted that our clerk role is paid at £12 per hour. Not clear if offering a higher rate would attract more candidates and the Parish may not be able to afford more.

CONTRACTS: There were no new updates.

VILLAGE DAY AND CORONATION PLANNING: Funding from District Councillor's localities funding has paid for the cost of 60 Coronation mugs. These are to be given out at the pub during the Coronation weekend, one free for every young person in the Parish aged 16 or under on 6th May Any not given out will be used by the Pub for prizes at Coronation events or sold on the bar for pub funds – the Pub is organising a 3 day Coronation weekend.

The Village Hall is organising a coffee morning on the Monday of the weekend.

SLAPTON LINE PARTNERSHIP

The meeting will be held at Follaton House on Friday 24th Feb at 12pm. KG and GC to attend. The Agenda is seen as a positive one.

SLAPTON MEMORIAL No new information.

VARIOUS S106 LAND MATTERS LN reported that the Blackbird Wood Trustees have met and are filling in the S106 form. As a part of the application the PC needs to send a letter of support. PH to write a suitable letter.

Playpark. There now appears to be security of tenure for the playpark. A backlog of various repairs needs to be dealt with. IC to organise. There is a possibility of new equipment using S106 money. Suggestion of a full 7 aside pitch but this creates problems with a goal being in front of gardens with greenhouses etc. Discussion re state of ground on playpark. The grass is too long and it was felt that it needs more regular cutting. The Contractor is to be asked to cut the grass shorter now. (IC) There were two offers from KG and DR to use sit on mowers to carry out regular trimming after the first cut.

ROAD SAFETY The new VAR needs to be installed in place. The new pole is in place PH to collect VAR from ex-clerk and check over ready to be fitted.

CLERK'S REPORT - Clerk vacancy, so none provided

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Strete Estate: On 6th February myself and Ralph Clark had an initial meeting with Brendan and Nigel Spokes, members of the family who are the new owners of Strete Estate This was by way of being an introductory meeting and was of a general nature where we touched on a number of aspects of village life and village facilities over the course of about an hour. Amongst other subjects, we discussed the Neighbourhood Plan in general terms and the lease on the playpark.

It is evident that the Spokes are still evaluating the extent and condition of their purchase before formulating firm plans for the future. However, they are committed to retaining the land for agricultural use and intend to develop businesses based upon agriculture. At our suggestion, the family will introduce themselves to the village via an article in Stretewise magazine.

Bus Services

From Sunday 1st January 2023, the cost of a single bus journey is capped at £2.00 on most Stagecoach routes in England, including the No.93 bus service through the village. The Bus Fare Cap scheme is a Government initiative which runs from 1st January until 31st March 2023. (Post meeting note – this scheme has been subsequently extended to 30th June 2023)

DevonBus Enhanced Partnership

Nothing to report. The minutes of the meeting on 19th January 23 have not yet been published pulically.

Slapton Line Partnership

A meeting of the Partnership has been convened for Friday 24th February, nearly 11 months since the last meeting. A consultant has been appointed to take over some of the duties of the vacant Adaptation Manager post. No agenda for this meeting has been received at the time of writing. (Post meeting note – an agenda has now been received).

Proposed relocation of the Slapton Line Memorial

Still nothing further to report. A response from the Field Sudies Council is awaited. Meantime reinforcing work has been going ahead on Slapton Beach car park this week.

Waste Collections

The new SHDC subscription green waste collection scheme will commence operations on 6th March. Subscribers will receive a bin sticker and notification of collection days in February (collection days will not necessarily be the same as normal recycling & black waste collection days)

Night Landing Site for the Devon Air Ambulance

Nothing further to report. This was one of the items raised and discussed with the Spokes.

Police Hub: Nothing further to report.

Additional Public Holiday – the King's Coronation.

The Coronation of King Charles III will take place on Saturday 6th May 2023.

Monday 8th May 2023 has been declared as an additional public holiday. The Kings Arms is planning a 3-day event over the weekend. The Parish Council intends to provide a free Coronation China mug to all village residents aged 16 or under on 6th May.

Strete Parish Clerk

The situation has now become critical, as the preferred applicant has dropped out and there have

been no further applicants for the post despite extensive local advertising. In my opinion, we are at the point where the lack of a Clerk is impinging upon the ability the Parish Council to properly function. With the upcoming local elections, this situation can only worsen.

Graham Campbell has kindly agreed once again to write the minutes of the February meeting. We have an offer to complete the end-of-year financial accounting statements by Helen, which is most welcome and gratefully accepted.

However, financial monitoring and other activities normally carried out by the Clerk will be held over until a new appointment has been made. Kicking off a new Parish Council in May without a Parish Clerk is likely to be particularly challenging.

Local Elections

Local elections will take place for South Hams District Council and Strete Parish Council on 4th May 2023. The appointment of Councillors is for a period of four years.

The election timetable has been issued and publication of the Notice of Election will take place on Thursday 23 March 2023, at which point nominations for Candidates will open and will remain open until **4pm on Tuesday 4th April.** Nominations have to be hand delivered to Follaton House in Totnes.

If any resident is thinking of standing for election to either District or Parish, I can provide an SHDC guide to the election procedure. Nomination packs will be made available shortly.

COUNCILLOR REPORTS.

Kate Gill: Kate provided by e-mail some useful photographs of the ongoing underpinning work at the middle car park on Slapton Line, with the following comment:- Please find attached the photos I took of the work on the saving of Slapton Line yesterday (13/2). The humps and bumps have now been smoothed out and people are able to walk on it.

Louise Newman: There is little to report on the roads apart from a pothole in Vicarage Lane and a small bit of wall damage on the road going down towards Coleridge Place.

Most of the hedges have now been cut and I attach the invoice from John Gilbert (John is aware there are still one or two bits to do including Kate's hedge).

This weekend we have the litter pick on Saturday and I am hoping people will come and help collect litter, there is some around the village but the litter is particularly bad on the main roads out of the village.

I have had another meeting with Pam Wills regarding the Melro Smithes wood, the S106 form is with one of the trustees who is working on it. In addition as a Parish Council we need to send the trustees a letter of support for the work on the woods.

David Rothwell: Please find below my report for February. I attended a meeting of the Village Hall Committee on Wednesday 8th February. Points discussed were:

Warm space/hot drinks, it was agreed to re-launch this initiative under the name of the 'Strete Community Cafe, with the hall being available for those wanting to meet for coffee and biscuits between 10.30 and 12.30 on a Monday morning. It was pointed out that in Slapton, it was the parish council that organised a similar event, with each week a member of the council helping out.

I mentioned to the committee that the Parish Council were arranging to purchase bone china coronation mugs and presentation boxes with the cost being off-set from a grant from councillor Foss's locality fund.

Quotes are being obtained to make safe the paving slabs in the entrance area.

Discussions are ongoing into energy saving possibilities for the hall which are now including the installation of batteries which will allow water heating, car charging points, infra red heating.

It was agreed that a quarterly meeting with representatives of the parish council, village hall, pub, church and chapel, should be arranged to agree a co ordinated approach into planning events in the village. As the pub are planning three days of events over the Coronation weekend, the hall will be arranging a Coronation Coffee and Cake morning between 10.30 and 12.00 On Monday 8th May in the hall.

Dog Waste Bins; I reported to South Hams District Council on the morning of Monday 13th February that the dog waste bins on the village green and by Manor Farm had not been emptied for some time. I am glad to say that they were both emptied later that day.

Ian Cumberlidge:

Very little to report this month, on the various subjects

Play Park.

I am aware of the number of items in need of repair, and now, it would seem that the future of the play park is secure. I have not received a "problems" report from S.H.D.C. this month, but now we can maybe set about rectifying some of the timber rot, rust, missingfittings, etc. The grass is in need of it's first cut.

Rights of Way, footpaths.

Nothing much to report on these, apart from the damage caused to the lower section of Prideaux Lane, which Graham has already mentioned. Due to the calm, and relatively mild weather conditions, the birds are starting to "nest". Dog owners/walkers need to be aware of this, (if they aren't already..) to minimize disturbance to ground-nesting birds, and hedgerow nesting birds.

Strete Gate.

All functioning OK, and the car park was cleared of litter by a chap from S.H.D.C last week.

Ralph Clark:

Neighbourhood Plan

Richard Howell who is the Chair of South Hams Society wrote in August last year to alert everyone to an email received from the Chair of the Ringmore NP Steering Group. He was concerned that the findings of the 'My Place, My Views' (MPMV) consultation being undertaken by South Hams District Council and West Devon Borough Council, in partnership with Plymouth City Council, would take precedence over policies in made Neighbourhood Plans when the next Joint Local Plan is drawn up.

He is pleased and relieved to be able to inform everyone that, thanks to the efforts of the Mayor of Kingsbridge, Philip Cole, the Society has now been assured this will not be the case.

At a recent Mayors & Clerks meeting held at Follaton House, the Mayor of Kingsbridge again raised the issue. He expressed his disappointment that the undertaking made by SHDC that the MPMV consultation would not override any local Neighbourhood Plans had not been included in the Minutes of the previous meeting. Those Minutes were only received a few days before the meeting. Consequently, he tabled a motion that the undertaking should be properly recorded.

The Mayor has informed everyone that Cllr Pearce confirmed that the MPMV consultation has now finished and that the Minute Taker was instructed properly to record the undertaking.

The value of having a Neighbourhood Plan was recently demonstrated in the determination of an appeal and a planning application in the Kingsbridge area.

The Kings Arms

A number of ideas are being developed to encourage customers to use the pub.

This includes the launch of the Friday Bar Night Draw on 10th February. It was greeted with much anticipation and decisions to purchase a number before the draw took place.

40 of the 50 numbers available were purchased before all 50 were entered into the draw box. The pub enjoyed the company of customers that generated a buzz of chat and laughter.

One lucky number was drawn from the draw box for the £50 voucher to spend in the Kings Arms and, fortunately, the owner of the number was in the bar to collect the voucher. Each number costs £5 and is a one-off purchase which means it's in the draw box each week with a chance to win a £50 voucher. The voucher must be used within two months of winning it.

If the person who bought the winning number is not in the bar at the time of the draw, it's a rollover to the following week and £10 is added to the draw. This continues each week until there is a winner in the bar. The voucher value is capped at £100. Importantly, customers who have bought a number must be in the bar between 6 and 8pm on a Friday to see their number drawn from the box to win the voucher.

The motivation is to encourage people to visit the Kings Arms for a couple of hours to communicate with each other about anything and everything.

It could also provide an opportunity to find out what the community would like to see the pub doing that could encourage them use the Kings Arms more frequently as a community pub.

The Kings Arms Loyalty Card is also being introduced in the next few weeks together with plans for the weekend of the Coronation of Kings Charles III in May.

Totnes Road Gateway Scheme

Nothing further to report.

The next village sweep will be on 28th March.

Graham Campbell:

Mark Wall is going to repair the damaged stone post at the exit to his land opposite Start Bay Park. John Wills has agreed to avoid using the Start Bay Park entrance to Prideaux Lane when the ground is wet.

AOB. The new Pub initiative to attract people into pub on Friday evenings for a draw has been successful.


1: Cut off a 20mm piece off the candle and make a hole through the centre of the candle.

2: Cut a grove across the candle on one side, this is to keep the long match stick that will drive your tank firmly in place.

3: If you have a wooden cotton reel cut grooves into both rims of the reel this will give extra traction. This may not be possible if you have a plastic reel.

4: Thread the rubber band through the hole in the cotton reel and segment of candle. Loop one end over half of one match stick then loop the other end of the rubber band over a full match stick. This match stick should be bigger than the reel and will drive your tank along.

5: Ready to go. Holding the tank in one hand wind by turning the long match until the rubber band is fairly tight.





6: Put it on the floor and watch it crawl. If you wanted to be really experimental you could try attaching a peg instead of the long match stick

and clipping a felt pen to the peg and see what patterns your tank makes.



Use a sheet of card to cut out your parrot outline and colour brightly.

Balancing Parrot

Tap a coin to the tail of the parrot and then try and balance the parrot on the edge of a table or the end of a pencil.

DISCOVER WELLBEING

There were two signposts which pointed towards Devon. I had a flat in a Victorian house in Hove called Devon Lodge and then I had a flat in London in a block, named Devonshire House. A chance meeting finally led me here to live.

Do you think it helps us to step out of our comfort zone, perhaps to do something extraordinary? What would you like to do?

Challenges help prevent us from stagnating. We need oxygenating. I volunteered for a charity in Romania which depends entirely on prayer for financial and material provision. Their faith was remarkable and I aspire to such faith and to have total trust in God. That would be extraordinary.

What is you favourite piece of music at this moment in time?

I think it is the chorus of the birds in the early morning. The most ancient music.



Carrot and Ginger Recipe

Ingredients

- 1 tsp coconut oil
- 1 white onion
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 4 or 5 carrots, chopped
- 2 tbs freshly chopped ginger
- 3 cups of water
- Tin of coconut milk
- (optional) chopped chives or parsley

Method

- 1. Melt the coconut oil in a pan and sauté the onion and garlic for 8 mins.
- Add the rest of the ingredients, except the coconut milk, and bring to the boil.
- 3. Turn down the heat and add the coconut milk. Cook for 20 minutes.
- Blend all together. Add chopped chives or parsley.





How to take an Awe Walk

- 1. Begin your walk by coming back to your breath.
- 2. Take a deep breath in.
- 3. Feel your feet on the ground.
- 4. Shift your awareness to what is around you, things that are vast or unexpected, things that delight or surprise you... count to 6 as you inhale and 6 as you exhale.
- 5. Let your attention be open in exploration, for what inspires 'awe'. Maybe the small veins of the leaves or the carpet of spring flowers all around you or the vastness of what is in front of you.
- 6. Bring your attention back to your breath, as you inhale and exhale.
 Coming out of these experiences, we often feel a sense of wonder & awe, which of course happens when we are moved to find explanations and deep meaning.

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

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
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
