During the work to create the Hall's new entrance path, the workmen found a rather damp mini 'time capsule'. Once dried it turned out to be part of a 1999 copy of Stretewise. In this it explained that The Parish Square was designed in January 1999 as a Project for the Millenium.

Below are extracts from this 1999 copy of Stretewise.

It was felt that a new entrance courtyard would provide a real amenity: a safe haven where Mums could sit and watch their toddlers playing in safety while they had a natter with friends. There could be seating where senior citizens might have a rest walking back from the shop, an area where perhaps the Youth Club could have the odd outdoor event in the summer and an area where stalls for Summer Fetes could be erected.

AN IDENTIFIABLE CENTRE - A PARISH SQUARE

Whilst the Hall will contribute funds as available for much of the skilled labour and materials, it is hoped that the organisations who use the Hall will look favourably towards grants and gifts. But hopefully, it will be the Villagers who will generously — "BUY A SLAB". They could then have their names written on the underside of slabs before they are laid.

An appeal went out to the Villagers and then with grants from SWEB(Electricity) and South Hams District Council, over £2,800 was collected.

Work started on 11th May to clear the land, levels were trimmed and land drains laid. 17 tonnes of stone were spread by hand by three Sub-Lieuts from BRNC. This work was completed by lunchtime and all retired into the Hall where the Committee Ladies had prepared a splendid lunch of beef casserole with dumplings.

On 22nd/23rd May work started on laying the slabs by Gary McCoy assisted by David Hackett, Ken Parnell, Malcolm Shuttleworth, David Snook, Peter Maynard and David Dugdale.

Hopefully by the next edition of Stretewise the Parish Square will have been completed, the landscape and seats in place and the area being used – a focal point for Village activities.

The Kings Arms: Fundraising

You can now become a subscriber to the Kings Arms!

Why are we doing this when many of you have already contributed a considerable amount?

The Kings Arms Committee has worked hard to ensure sound management of the business, but realistically, trade cannot be accelerated to the extent needed in a village the size and demographic of Strete, especially when set against a particularly brutal economic environment. We have no other option but to raise additional funds for the foreseeable future to offset anticipated losses of c. £45 - £50k annually. (We'll provide more detail about these numbers in a later newsletter and can be discussed at the AGM later in the year.) In order to meet the shortfall, we have a multipronged approach to raising funds to ensure the future of our pub. But of course...

We continually seek creative ways to grow trade, and push down hard on costs to maximise profits . There have been numerous improvements but keeping a rural pub open will never be easy. Good summers are critical. In the past the committee have used share offers to raise additional funds. This time, rather than another share offer, we aim to do this via a subscription scheme, which we consider to be a fair way of sharing the cost across a broader base and is, hopefully, a more affordable means for more people to contribute. This small monthly payment is akin to a Netflix or magazine subscription. Other community ventures have done this and it has proven successful.

We have three recommended subscription levels: **Bronze** at £10, **Silver** at £20, and **Gold** at £30 per month. Subscribers will be in control of their payments and can cancel at any time.

Ordinarily, a different level of subscription would afford different levels of privilege, but that is not the case here. We have explored doing so, but it would cause unintended and unwelcome consequences, detracting from the benefits to the pub and the purpose of this scheme. It is simply that multiples of relatively small monthly payments, with people paying what they can afford, will help keep the pub afloat.

We have already had pledges to subscribe from some shareholders and prospective benefactors.

The Kings Arms will, of course, seek additional avenues of funding. We are approaching local benefactors and businesses, for whom preserving the pub within the village is particularly important, and we will run fundraising campaigns throughout the year that reach a wider audience in the effort to spread the financial load beyond the village.

The Kings Arms isn't just a pub — it's our pub, and it's where community spirit thrives.

The pub has been a cornerstone of our village life for generations. Community involvement helps preserve this rich heritage for years to come. In an age of digital connectivity, the pub offers irreplaceable face-to-face interactions where friendships are forged, strengthening the bonds that make our village special.

By keeping the Kings Arms thriving, we're supporting other local businesses that rely on the pub's presence and custom. From celebratory pints to Sunday roasts, the pub is where experiences are shared and lasting memories are made. 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

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STRETE PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES OF STRETE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 16TH MAY, 2024 STRETE VILLAGE HALL

PRESENT COUNCILLORS:

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE:

None

ELECTION OF NEW CHAIR

Peter Hales stood down as chair and will not stand for re-election. RC thanked PH for the excellent job he has done in his three years as chair. As current deputy chair, RC put himself forward for election as new chair. No other nominations received. PH Proposed RC as chair and KG Seconded. Unanimous agreement from the councillors.

DISTRICT COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

LL announced household support fund available for households in the South Hams who are struggling with daily living costs. It is a one-off payment to provide financial support to pay for food, bills or household goods and is open to the lowest income households initially but is expected to be opened up to others. LL will share link to the scheme with SPC via email.

Decarbonisation support scheme is available for local businesses/organisations. Funding will be provided for specialist consultancy. LL will share link to the scheme with SPC via email.

LL will share information via email regarding DEFRA grant that may benefit the village hall's proposal for an EV charging point. Councillors invited to send questions and ideas for Fusion Lifestyle (leisure centres) to LL to forward on.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

Devolution: Devolution deal has been agreed by DCC and Torbay and has gone up to Westminster for approval. JB believes everything will be renegotiated in the future so as to not leave Plymouth behind and also as the district councils feel very left out by the current proposal.

Safety Valve scheme: Central government has accepted DCCs application to the Safety Value Scheme, giving the council access to £95 million to help with the cumulative deficit it has accrued in its SEND service. Part of the deal is that the services no longer run at a deficit. JB does not yet know how this will be achieved and is aware that other counties, who previously signed up to the safety valve subsequently dropped out as cost saving service cuts were so unpalatable.

Strategy meeting held with Devon and Plymouth to decide what a good Freeport will look like. Hoping for highly paid and highly skilled jobs. Sherford and Langage site is area that will be the Freeport and businesses sited there will receive various tax breaks. RC asked what information is available about how other freeports that are already in existence are working. JB shared that most are at a very early stage. One concern is that they do displace businesses from other areas due to the tax breaks. The overall view is the "jury is still out" and some of them get bad press but if targets are hit it will be a positive for the area. Plymouth city population is declining and 5000 houses are being built at Sherford (building is progressing at a slow rate due to lack of demand). PH understands that councils have aspirations for developing certain industries and wondered if they will point them towards freeport. JB advised that DCC signpost access to business facilities and support but in his opinion, it is not for the council to take the lead (though he pointed out that other councillors may have more interest in promoting the freeport).

RC noted that DCC have been granted £12 million funding and would like the damaged road outside the village shop to be repaired.

JB stated that has heard RCs message "loud and clear". He does not believe that the road will be closed during the summer season but they may be able to do an interim repair.

DANNI BRIEN REPRESENTING DARTMOUTH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE (SUMMARY)

Danni Brien and Laura Campbell introduced the Chamber of Commerce, who meet on the third Tuesday of each month. The chamber has already represented 123 local business members interests in negotiations for the Dartmouth park and ride and in securing free berthing days at the harbour. The chamber is trying to raise the profile of Dartmouth as a competitor to other more well-known towns. They aim to make the Dartmouth area an easier place to run a business by advocating supporting and encouraging collaboration between local businesses. The chamber is currently focused on Dartmouth in December and are involved in the visitors centre where they are developing a business hub.

Councillors asked about plans for the shortage of skilled labour in the hospitality industry and the chamber are already speaking to DCC about transport and housing accessibility and with South Devon College about apprenticeships.

An article about the chamber will be coming out in Streetwise magazine.

Councillors approved purchase of gift for BW as gratitude for auditing accounts.

5. 106 LAND MATTERS

Final payment applied for and BACs remittance advice received. All monies spent.

6. PLAYPARK MAINTENANCE

SHDC report states same faults each time. Inspector has confirmed verbally to IC that none of the issues reported are dangerous. IC keeping repairs within budget. RC reminded IC that if there is anything that needs to be fixed urgently due to a safety issue, or if IC needs assistance, funds are set aside.

7. ROAD SAFETY

£12million has become available to DCC. SPC are keen that funding is distributed equally throughout the county. SPC are concerned about damage to road outside shop and the danger it proposes to all road users but especially pedestrians. SPC are seriously concerned about the state of the A379 linking Strete to Kingsbridge between Torcross and right through Stokenham and Chillington. Concerns have been escalated to DCC.

8. SLAPTON LINE PARTNERSHIP

PH emailed DCC highways representatives after APM. No other updates and no meetings scheduled. RC suggested contacting John Fewings and Josh Mannings every three months for an update. Date to be scheduled at the June meeting.

9. CYCLICAL DRAINAGE WORKS

Councillors articulated that current situation is untenable and unfair on residents, who are effectively paying twice. DCC are not carrying out works satisfactorily and so SPC are forced to employ their own contractors and charge the residents via the precept. Training is available for volunteer lengths man.

Action: Clerk to check latest funding position.

10. INSURANCE

Councillors reviewed renewal documents and alternate quote. Approval of councillors obtained to accept renewal received from Clear Councils. Alternatively, if Clear Councils will agree to a three-year undertaking councillors would prefer this option, so long as the first year's premium is no more than £550.00 per annum. Note: Three-year undertaking agreed with Clear Councils after the meeting.

RC queried depreciation on items on asset register and HD explained that with small entities, according to JPAGS guide the most common recorded value of asset is the price at the time it was purchased. Councillors deliberated on the information provided and agreed to retain the status quo.

Action: Clerk to request quote for three-year undertaking. If this is not possible or quote is more than £550.00 per annum clerk to negotiate on renewal price.

11. OTHER ONGOING MATTERS IF NOT COVERED ELSEWHERE

Dave Jones, editor of Streetwise magazine asked if councillors would like anything included in the magazine before the deadline on 23rd May.

Start Bay Park footpath has been cleared by the residents of number 17, appreciation of other residents has been noted.

Action: Clerk to send minutes of April meeting to Dave Jones. Councillors to share any information to be included in the magazine.

12. CLERK'S REPORT

Lloyds have confirmed the account switching process. The interest rate at NatWest is higher than the interest rate we anticipate receiving from Lloyds 1.46%AER vs 1.31%.

I have shared the requested documentation with SHDC to facilitate final payment from the s106 grant and a BAC remittance advised was received on 15/05/2024 confirming payment.

Comments were uploaded to the SHDC planning portal following last month's meeting.

I have obtained access to the government gateway and can now submit a VAT reclaim at the end of this month for all invoices up to 31st May 2024. I contacted DALC regarding the impending insurance renewal. They confirmed that insurance prices have increased dramatically. On their advice I approached three brokers to obtain quotes for the insurance renewal. Zurich provided a quote which I have shared with councillors, James Hallam (Aviva) advised that they do not feel any of their products would be suitable for the parish council due to their minimum premiums.

The clerk for Blackawton Parish Council has advised that "BPC has a contractor (60 hours per year) who clears drainage channels on the roads in the parish. This supplements the work done by DCC as the responsible authority".

Five payments for hedge cutting out of twelve are outstanding as at 12th May 2024.

13. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman's role: As intimated to Councillors at the April Parish Council Meeting, I will be standing down as Chairman at the start of the May meeting after three years in the role. I will not be offering myself for re-election on this occasion. It has been an honour to serve the Community as Chairman of the Parish Council over the past three years, but I feel that it is now in the best interests of the Village that someone else should take over the reins. All of us Councillors have a particular individual style and approach towards the PC, and I believe that it is important for the health of the Parish Council that there is a regular turn-over of leadership to ensure diversity.

We are currently running with one vacancy on the PC and I believe that we should make an increased effort to fill this role with a new councillor, in order to provide both succession and (again) some diversity and fresh views. If there is anyone in the community who feels that they would like to know more about the duties of a Parish Councillor, we would be grateful if you would make yourself known to any Councillor – you will be made very welcome.

Bus Services and Road Closures Nothing to report.

Slapton Line Partnership

There is nothing further to report from the Partnership, as no meeting has been convened for a couple of months. However, Josh Manning and John Fewings, two staff members from Devon Highways, attended the Annual Parish Meeting in April and explained options for improving the minor road network in the area in anticipation of a catastrophic future breach of the A379 road over the Line. This was part of a series of meetings with local Parishes to explain their proposals to residents and Gauge local opinions.

There were a number of questions from the floor, and the Parish Council followed up on this meeting with the following written response, which was also copied to Anthony Mangnall MP, the interim Chairman of the Slapton Line Partnership: -

Thanks once again for attending the Strete Annual Parish Meeting on 18th April and explaining your ideas about reinforcing the back-routes for the communities that would be affected in the event of the loss of the A379 over Slapton Line. I thought it might be worthwhile just jotting down a note about some of the ideas discussed. Public Transport and heavy vehicles In Strete, we are particularly concerned about what would happen to public transport and access for HGVs, goods delivery vehicles and large farm traffic in our area in the event of loss of the road over the line. These aspects of transport are important to the economic and social welfare of the village and surrounding area. Tourism and business are supported by transport access, and in particular the 93 bus route which currently connects communities along the coast between Dartmouth and Kingsbridge, a route which is also important for supporting walkers on the South Devon Coastal Path. Breach of the A379 will mean that the public transport strategy for the area will need to be re-thought. It follows that the road from Strete up to the A3122 will likely be required to bear the additional burden of heavy vehicle access and a revised bus route in order to ensure that some sort of route is available. As a Parish Council, we believe that this factor should be 'designed in' with any proposed improvements and therefore the whole route from Strete right up to the A3122 should be assessed for improvement and the passage of buses and heavy vehicles.

You will have heard a speaker from the floor ask that your proposals should be ".....a bit more ambitious". The Parish Council echoes this view. We believe that there are multiple areas on this route where significant improvements could be made if the will to do so and the finance is there to support. Indeed, the northern part of this route would benefit the residents of Slapton and Stokenham as well as Strete, as demonstrated by the routes indicated on your handout. Junction improvements at adjoining A roads

In the proposals presented on your handout, there are two places where the proposed 'Blue routes' meet the A381 and the A3122 as 'T' junctions. Currently the sightlines and layout of these junctions are poor and they lie in de-restricted speed areas where traffic speeds are high. Strete Parish Council believes that they should really be significantly re-engineered in order to improve traffic safety. We briefly discussed the use of roundabouts and your points about cost and suitability were well made. However, as an alternative perhaps some thought could be given to providing a dedicated 'right turn' lane at these junctions (as they will be carrying significantly greater amounts of potentially slow-moving heavy vehicles in the event of a breach of the Line). together with the improvements to aspect and sightlines that you offered. Timescale Finally, I think it is fair to say that the meeting as a whole was dismayed to hear that you thought that the timescale for the work may take in excess of 10 years to implement. Whilst we understand that the work will be budget constrained, the whole point of the exercise is to have the improvements in place before there is a catastrophe. None of us knows when that might be, so a plan which implements sooner rather than later must be preferred. We will continue to press for the improvement programme to be implemented in full as soon as possible.

Devon Devolution Proposals

On 25th January Central Government published proposals for a Devolution Deal ".... which will provide the Devon and Torbay area with new powers and funding to increase opportunities and living standards through inclusive growth and productivity improvements."

The deal is part of the "levelling up" programme that the Government has been pursuing country wide. It will require the formation of a new tier of local government, proposed as Devon and Torbay Combined County Authority (CCA).

Following the public consultation which ended on 24th March Devon and Torbay Councils produced a revised Devon and Torbay Combined County Authority – Final Proposal which was submitted to Central Government on 1st May. It is available to view here:

Legislation will now be drafted in accordance with this proposal to bring about the implementation of the Devolution proposals.

Strete Annual Parish Meeting

This took place on Thursday 18th April

Cyclic Contracts Grant

The Parish Council finally received a response from Devon Highways on this issue. The authority has declined to devolve their budget for cyclic maintenance to the Parish, but it is clear that they are not fulfilling their maintenance responsibilities regarding drainage and sweeping, necessitating additional expense for residents through Parish funds. This is an unacceptable state of affairs and the Parish will continue to push for a more equitable solution.

14. COUNCILLORS' REPORTS.

Ralph Clark PC Report - May 2024

Planning:

Rose Cottage planning application to convert the barn attached to the property into living accommodation has still not yet been approved.

Strete Village Hall: Following detailed discussions to improve the paving at the Village Hall, it has been decided to utilise the lottery grant to remove the existing surface slabs at the entrance to the Village Hall and increase the width of the footpath section from the road to the gate to provide sufficient wheelchair access. This will include extensive ground works and edging to provide surface drainage and compaction for the final resin bound surface to be installed. Strete Village Day is in August, and monthly meetings have started to discuss and agree the content for the event to ensure there is sufficient support available on the day. Various organisations in the village are invited to attend these meetings as it is hoped that funds raised on the day will be shared with organisations who are able to put forward beneficial proposals for Strete community. This is an important fund-raising event for the Village Hall.

Village Sweeping and Road Works: Dartmouth Triathlon is due to take place on Sunday 9th June 2024. The event organisers have applied for a road closure on Blackpool Valley Road in the morning from 7am until 1pm.

In 2023 a small number of large vehicles on Blackpool Valley Road caused significant problems for the runners. In some places on that lane, it's not wide enough for runners to easily get past large 4x4s. Prescribed Chapter 8 Signage will placed in advance. All residents on that road will be contacted in advance by letter. Devolution in Somerset has prompted discussions with town and parish councils to consider adopting some of the routine works currently undertaken by SCC to ease pressure on their budget. Devon CC have approved £12m funding for repairs to its highways including potholes. We must ensure this is shared fairly throughout the county. Surface repairs on the A379 (Priority Road) at the junction with Totnes Road (outside the Post Office and Shop) has seen nothing happen after uploading this to the Devon CC 'Report a Problem' website. This is a Category 1 defect that should be actioned for repair in 7-days.

Update: DCC Highway engineers observed inspecting the site this week presumably to determine the surfacing requirements for the site. Hopefully, something will happen soon. In addition, surface patching to some of the highway edges of Totnes Road observed.

Graham Campbell - May 2024

Greenspace: The contractor has cut the playpark grass short and has rolled it well. He says that any high spots will now be dealt with by the new mower.

Greenspace is also dealing with the Ivy that has overgrown on the village well on the field.

Other grass cutting has been done.

No contact regarding Slapton Line Partnership. There has been a considerable reshaping of the beach in recent weeks.

Dartmouth Chamber of Commerce

Danni Brien and Laura Campbell introduced the Chamber of Commerce, which was set up in January as a voice for businesses in Dartmouth and the surrounding areas. The chamber has already become involved in issues that affect trade in the area such as transport and parking and were pleased to represent local business interests in negotiations for the Dartmouth park and ride price increase.

The chamber is trying to raise the profile of Dartmouth and get it on the map as a competitor to other more well-known towns and they aim to make Dartmouth and the area an easier place to run a business by:

- Advocating for
- Supporting
- Encouraging collaboration

Funded training is being sourced to help businesses who may otherwise not be able to access training due to their small size.

123 members are already signed up (including businesses in Strete). Sign up is currently at a reduced rate of £10 per annum while the chamber is still getting set up.

Jonathan Fisher from the National Trust and representatives from South Devon College (SDC) have already given talks.

The chamber is working on a number of projects. The current focus is on Dartmouth in December (a programme of events between the candlelit procession on 30th November and 1st January dip in the river). They are looking to schedule events to avoid clashes. The harbour has agreed to free berthing on Thursdays to boost shopping. Kingswear are getting involved in the chamber and they have also reached out to Blackawton.

Laura and Jo Hinde pitched proposal of how to move the visitors centre forward. Their bid was selected. They have already launched a new official Dartmouth tourism website. The visitors centre will be developed and the available space split between tourist information and a business hub, offering space to work, office equipment e.g. a laminator to laminate menus etc and advice such as making the most of social media.

The chamber meets on the third Tuesday of the month and the meetings have an engagement session to find out what businesses want and what support can be given.



PH asked about plans for the shortage of skilled labour in the hospitality industry.

The chamber has spoken to JB about transport and housing accessibility as these are barriers. Working with DCC and SDC to look at apprenticeships. SDC have training available to upskill jobs. They are also looking at experience packages to attract seasonal workers to choose to come here. Looking to other countries methods e.g. New Zealand are looking at two-year visitors. They are hopeful that promoting tourism will let people know what exciting businesses there are in Dartmouth. The Premier Inn will attract people who regularly use the Premier Inn and are signed up the loyalty programme etc.

KG asked if the chamber have anything planned for D Day and explained the plans for the beacon at the camp site in Strete.

LC explained that they have only been involved in the museum for six weeks. A new exhibition has been launched and they will look to link up with the D-Day celebrations. A new media team have been set up and the chamber asked KG to provide the details to link it to their local story telling.

An article about the chamber will be coming out in Streetwise magazine.

RC offered to publish information on Strete Website.



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Grilled Vegetables Skewers

- Combine the olive oil, vinegar, garlic, lemon juice, smoked paprika, oregano and thyme in a shallow dish; season with sea salt and black pepper.
 Coat the aubergine, peppers, courgette and red onions in the marinade.
- Thread the vegetables and bay leaves alternately onto metal or pre-soaked wooden skewers. Place on a foil-lined tray and grill for 15 mins, turning regularly, until golden and beginning to char. Or, grill on the barbecue over a medium heat for 15 mins, turning regularly. Brush the remaining marinade over the skewers as they cook.

Roast Garlic Bulbs

Garlic, cooked until soft is transformed, caramelised and smooth the flavour is so different to raw garlic.

- Slice the top of the garlic bulb off (depending on the size of your bulb around 1/4 to a 1/2 of an inch from the top) to expose the individual cloves.
- Drizzle the top of the garlic cloves with olive oil.
- Cover the bulb with aluminium foil.
- Place on a hot grill, over indirect heat, for approximately 40 minutes.
 They should be soft and caramelised when roasted through.

Ingredients

- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 2 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 red peppers, cut into 3cm pieces
- 1 courgette, thickly sliced then halved
- 1 aubergine, thickly sliced and quartered
- 2 red onions, cut into quarters
- 3 bay leaves halved

Padron Peppers

Padron peppers plants are easily grown from seed but will need to be kept in doors or a greenhouse. Padron peppers are occasionally available in supermarkets. Used whilst still green & immature and are very mild, however, 1 in 10 may be hot.


 Heat olive oil in a large frying pan over a high heat. Fry the peppers, stirring frequently, for 5 mins until blistered and wilted. The peppers should be soft and slightly charred. Transfer the peppers to a serving plate and season with sea salt.

Padrón pepper provides Vitamins A, B2, B6, C, E and K, as well as Potassium, Phosphorus, Magnesium and Calcium.










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
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My interviewee this time is George Robertson who is an amazing musician, and a very creative and interesting person.

Our Summer Picnic Recipe Apricot and Pistachio Flapjack

Ingredients

- 140g butter
- · 140g soft brown sugar
- · 2 tbsp honey
- · 175g rolled oats
- · 75g chopped pistachios
- · 140g dried chopped apricots

Method

- Preheat oven to 160C / 140C fan / gas 4.
- Put butter, soft brown sugar and honey in a small pan, then heat gently until melted.
- Tip oats, pistachios and apricots into a medium bowl. Pour over the melted butter mixture and stir to combine.
- 4. Transfer to a 20cm x 20cm greased and lined baking tray and cook for 35 - 40 mins. Remove and cool in tin, then slice into 16. Will keep in an airtight container for up to 3 days.





A Mental Analgesic

Start by taking a few long slow breaths, focussing on the exhale.

- SEE. Notice five things that you can see around you
- TOUCH. Find four things to touch. Try to vary the textures... perhaps a petal, piece of bark, or a blade of grass

meeting. Again, a very good attendance all looking forward to a Magical Afternoon.


Karen started promptly and as there was very little business except arranging our next meeting which is a visit to Avon Mill Garden Centre for afternoon tea, which seems to

9th **JULY 2024:** Karen Hales welcomed everyone to our early July meeting even if the weather was not very good for July!

We were delighted to welcome our member Heather Robinson as our Speaker with a talk intriguingly titled "My skeletons were not in my cupboard". Heather skilfully told the story of the discovery of skeletons in the garden of her previous home near Dartmouth Castle. Her talk was supported by some fascinating pictures and articles written about what one called "How a macabre mystery was solved."

During the landscaping of the garden in the grounds of Heather's house in Castle Road Dartmouth in 1985, a skull was found. Their spooky find did not entirely surprise Heather and her late husband Derek, as the remains of five skeletons had already been exposed by workmen when they were building the couple's home in 1969. The house was near One Gunn Point previously the site of the Gunfield Hotel. At the time of the original discovery, the pair had alerted police, but since the skeletons were dated more than 100 years old, they were of no interest to the police and were returned to the ground.

Since the skull in the garden had not been disturbed until 1985, it was believed by Ray Freeman a local historian to be worthy of archaeological investigation. Since no professional archaeologist could undertake the work, a small excavation was conducted by Ray and a team of about 20 volunteers in order to establish the character and date of these burials. The volunteers were from various backgrounds including Heather a retired nurse, along with doctors and dentists all with useful knowledge in assessing the finds. As Ray said in her article "the enthusiasm of the team compensated for their somewhat advanced years and tendency to back trouble". So, armed with trowels, brushes and plastic bags for finds, they set to work. Eight burials were excavated and a total of fourteen skeletons were eventually unearthed. The skeletons, all male except one female buried alongside a tall man, were given names to somehow give the project a human side with some light heartedness.

The puzzle was then investigated. Many theories around historical events including the Civil War were discounted. Clues to the age of the burials included that a fragment of pine was discovered thought to be part of a coffin, and pine was not a native wood and only imported in large quantities from the Baltic after 1600. Devon Records Office indicated that local people were buried within the churchyard. A study of St. Petroc's Church parish registers revealed some scribbled entries from 1676 recording burials of

two Frenchmen one belonging to "a great ship from the West Indies buryed at One Gunn." This suggested that Gunn Point was the customary place to bury foreigners who died on ships coming into the port but who did not wish to be buried at sea, and others who had no connection with the parish.

Finally, all bones were reburied with a proper Christian service and a memorial plaque was made. Heather felt that she had thus done the right thing by them.

Heather was warmly thanked by Lisa for an excellent talk with fascinating documents that members studied throughout their customary tea and biscuits. It seems that Heather has another tale to tell about a mermaid sculpture in her garden at the harbour entrance but we must wait for another occasion! Karen Hales.

HERITAGEG ATEW AY

Freeman, R., 1985, Diary of an Unofficial Archaeological Dig, Haven Lights, Castle Road,

Dartmouth (Un-published). SDV341413.

Account of the progress of the excavation, and details of earlier finds of human remains at One Gun Point in 1985. Site lies at circa SX88495041 with five further burials reportedly discovered in 1969 and now beneath house then being built at circa SX88505040.

Freeman, R., 1985, Post-medieval burials near Dartmouth Castle, 131-4 (Article in Serial). SDV341410.

Post medieval burials were found in the grounds of Gunfield Hotel and adjacent properties. Following the discovery of human remains a small excavation was conducted in order to establish the character and date of these burials. Remains of at least eight burials were found. A full description and discussion of the excavation is given. The archaeological evidence suggests a post-1600 burial ground for mostly male adults. A 17th century document gives 'One Gunn' as a burial place for foreigners some of whom were seafarers on visiting ships.





Strete Social Club 23rd July: The last meeting before our summer break was in the usual format. We have a produce stall to

which members bring anything from garden produce to store cupboard items.

This received great support covering two long tables.

Karen opened the meeting firstly by thanking us all for the contributions to the sale and to the ladies who had set up the room and worked in the kitchen.
