
10th January. Members of Strete Social Club met in the village hall for their first meeting of 2023 which was their Annual General Meeting.

The job offers 25 hours of work per month at a pay rate around £12/hour depending upon experience.


Most of the job can be done at home with flexible hours to suit the job holder. Attendance at Parish Council meetings one evening per month to take meeting minutes is essential.

PRESENT: Cllr Peter Hales (PH) (Chairman); Cllr Louise Newman (LN); Cllr Ralph Clark (RC); Cllr Kate Gill (KG); Cllr Ian Cumberlidge (IC); Cllr Graham Campbell (GC); Cllr David Rothwell (DR); County Councillor Julian Brazil (JB); District Councillor Richard Foss (RF); The Clerk. Three members of the public.

PUBLIC FORUM: Mr. Nick Hindmarsh attended on behalf of Dartmouth Caring to give a presentation on the aims of the organisation. Dartmouth Caring will be working from the new Health and Wellbeing Centre up by the Leisure Centre from next year. The service works in three main areas: to support the elderly, to help younger clients with complex social needs and to help those with specialist health needs. Among its services is the memory café in Dartmouth, transport to and from hospitals, shopping and other helps to housebound people. A warm hub is on offer this winter and a meals on wheels service continues to run. It helps some 750 people annually and fills many of the gaps in statutory services. There are 112 volunteers and six fulltime equivalent staff. Its income comes mostly from government, from charities, fund raising, and some from users.

The new Centre will allow the service to offer social prescribing, partnership with the Leisure Centre and Pool, drop-in services and exercise classes. The new Centre will also house a palliative and cancer care liaison nurse who will help clients when a diagnosis is received.

Sgt Abercrombie was unable to attend but had been asked to make the December meeting.

Two parishioners attended to explain planning application **2513/22/HHO.** This will see the modernisation of the house with an increase in the upstairs space hence the garage roof will be raised 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ metres. However the footprint of the house will be unchanged. The conservatory will have a solid roof. They have spoken with neighbours and believe there are no overlooking issues. The parishioners then left the meeting.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

The A379 at Frogmore has reopened. There will be a road closure from the village to Landcombe from 28th November for a week. Also, Loddiswell will be shut from 28th November for a week for resurfacing. In 2023 the A379 at Modbury will be closed for three months.

RC observed a radar gun/speed capture device has been fitted at the top of the Totnes Road as part of the Highways traffic survey for the Gateway project.

JB reported on the parlous state of finances at Devon County Council [DCC]. He noted DCC at the moment is overspent by £37mn. This can be capitalized and repaid over 50 years. However, there is a possibility that one or more local tiers of government disappear and a unitary authority replaces these tiers.

The cap on council tax increases has been temporarily raised to 5% for 2023/24 so councils may levy an additional 2% on charge payers before a referendum needs to be called. The 5% is comprised of 3% on council tax and 2% on adult social care. JB noted the Liberal Democrats don't

support this measure as they believe central government should provide adequate funding and not rely on a regressive tax on local people.

IC asked when the wall would be rebuilt at Stoke Fleming. JB thought during the spring or autumn when the roads are quieter. JB thought a diversion route via Cinders Lane or Ravensbourne Lane would work and maybe a quad rider to keep the traffic flowing but cost may prohibit this.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Planning and housing. RF observed no 10 The Plat had gone to Development Management committee, as he had called it in, and has been approved. The planning department has been taken back to the two original councils i.e., South Hams and West Devon but there remains a problem with recruitment of planners. However, there are some good enforcement officers now. He observed people shouldn't take enforcement matters to appeal as this takes them out of the planning authority's responsibility. He also noted a rise in preapplication advice being taken.

The Plymouth and South West Devon Joint Local Plan 2014 -2034 [JLP] was being amended to include supplementary special planning guidance. SHDC has approved an amendment which affects DEV32 $Delivering\ Low\ .$

Carbon Development in the JLP. This does not change policy until the planning inspector has reviewed it but it reflects intention. Thus, the special planning guidance will require anyone who buys a house and knocks it down to justify the carbon footprint and that the new build decreases the carbon output by 20%.

One aim is to make more housing available to local people. The next review of the JLP is in 2024. This might also be a good time to look again at the Strete neighbourhood Plan. RF also noted there is a need to provide more housing in villages to help local people who can't afford house prices. The Leveling Up and Regeneration Bill is intended to be in force by April 2024 and this will allow local councils to levy twice the council tax charge on second homes. He reckoned this would see an additional £700,000 revenue collected on council tax.

Refuse collection. Now the garden waste service is discontinued the crews will be taken onto the domestic waste rounds to improve the box collection. He observed the system inherited from the contractor is too labor-intensive but the crews are more responsive to missed collections now and a new manager is very supportive and rides with the crews.

Although taking the service back inhouse cost money, the lapsed contract had been fixed price so there is a saving of around £300,000 compared to an inflation-linked agreement.

Grants available. RF noted he has localities money still available until the end of March 2023. So, if there were any projects that would benefit the community as a whole and wanted a small sum of money, please ask him. PH suggested a sum of £240 toward the costs of the enhanced Internet in the Hall. RF agreed. **Resolved the Clerk to apply for these monies.**

The memorial. JB noted that DCC has money to move the memorial to the location owned by the Field Studies Centre behind the carpark at Strete Gate but RF cautioned that costs have increased and there is a 3 metre₃ concrete block under the memorial which has to be removed before it can be resited. The meeting commented that one way

might be to try to get the Field Studies Centre to contribute to the costs. **Resolved someone will** need to consult the six parishes to resolve the draft agreement on maintenance.

Slapton Line Partnership. RF confirmed he is still trying to find a chair to run the meetings to get them going again. In the meantime, the MP is waiting for central government funds toward both the short-term and long-term projects he outlined at the May town hall meeting.

Foliaton House. Councillors voiced their disappointment that the council offices remain closed. RF advised them to email Andy Bates the Chief Executive of SHDC to express their concern.

1122/2 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 20TH OCTOBER 2022

1122/3 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Parish Councillors were invited to declare any unregistered or other interest, including the nature and extent of such interests they may have in any items to be considered at this meeting. **GC declared an interest in Fairfileld.**

1122/4 PLANNING & PLANNING MATTERS

Planning applications consulted on. To discuss and respond to South Hams District Council on:

2513/22/HHO. Householder application for raising of roof to create master bedroom and ensuite, part conversion of garage for additional kitchen/dining space, replacement conservatory and minor interior alterations. 1 Crestway, Strete. TQ6 OSF. Councillors discussed the plans and whether there might be an issue with the raised roofline.PH suggested a response be taken from the officer's wording for No 10 the Plat in connection with the nature of the proposed roofline. **Resolved to support with comments as follows:** *The councillors express concern over the intention to raise the roof as outlined in the plans. This is not considered a subservient addition to the dwelling as the proposed ridge line is the same height as the existing dwelling.*

3700/22/HHO. Householder application for alterations and kitchen extension, alterations to entrance. Slide House, Hynetown Road, Strete TQ6 0RS. **Resolved to support.**

3747/22/HHO. Householder application for addition of two balconies to rear and side elevations. Fairfield, Hynetown Road, Strete TQ6 ORS. Councillors considered the possibility that one balcony might overlook the neighbour to the South [Hylside]. RC reminded councillors that 21 metres is the guideline for a suitable distance from neighbours when assessing whether a development overlooked its neighbours. Councillors felt this south facing balcony was a grey area and risked being invasive on the neighbour. **Resolved to object on the basis one balcony would overlook a neighbour [Hylside].**

Other planning matters. None were raised.

1122/5 PARISH COUNCIL TARGETS FOR 2022/23

- Night landing site for air ambulance. Still awaiting response from Savills on the proposal sent in August to purchase some land for a landing area. The Strete Estate has now been sold: exchange has taken place and completion is awaited. Tenants will be contacted by the agent in due course.
- **Enhanced vehicle speed control measures in the Village**. A radar device is now in place to undertake a count of vehicles and measure speeds at the Totnes road end of the village.

The VAS speed measuring machine still awaits installation by a DCC highways engineer. **JB to pursue this.**

- * Raise awareness of forthcoming green grants for domestic heating, insulation etc. The visit by the South Dartmoor Community Trust on November 9th was not well-attended. Noted.
- Secure electric vehicle charging facility in the Village. PH responded to a consultation by DCC on EV provision. DCC has failed to plan for EV charging points outside main conurbations. PH will write to them to express his disappointment that rural areas won't have charging infrastructure. This is required for locals and tourists.
- Identify sites for tree planting in the Village. Resolved: The Clerk to send round information on the designated status of the Village Green.

1122/6(a) FINANCE

Three cheques were listed for payment on the agenda, invoices circulated before the meeting and invoices approved for payment at the meeting. Four additional invoices were circulated after the agenda date and approved at the meeting for payment.

It was proposed and AGREED by all present to authorise the payments as enumerated above.

1122/6(b) FINANCE

The monitoring statements for the first seven months to 30th November were circulated at the meeting. To date including the payments listed here there is total income of £16,889.78 less total expenses of £12,338.70 gives a net surplus of £4,551.08 in the year to the end of November 2022. The current position was noted.

1122/6(c) FINANCE

Cash at bank – £16,082.87CR at 08/11/22 Current account. £11,320.06CR Business Reserve account at 08/11/22.

1122/6(d) FINANCE

Discussion on precept for 2023/24 and individual budgets and savings in 2022/23.

PH started by reminding councillors the current precept for 2022/23 of £14,000 was a 6.6% rise [though only 1% on Band D due to an increased tax base] on the previous year' precept of £13,130 at a time when inflation was seen to be rising especially fuel costs. This year continues with fuel

inflation and general price inflation likely to continue into March 2024.

The recent referendum by post had garnered 29 responses [plus one email on broader issues] to proposals to use s137 [Local Government Act 1972] powers to raise an element of the precept to donate small sums to local charities which benefit the local community. The 's137 powers' permit parish councils to grant towards activities that benefit the local community or a part therefore. The amount for 2022/23 is a maximum of £8.82 per elector or £3,696; 2023/24 is not yet known. Although this would be a grant rather than a loan, conditions would attach under s137A which include scrutiny of the accounts where the amount granted is £2,000 or more. The results of the survey are in the appendix to these minutes.

To precis: 24 responses were in favour of some level of donation to Dartmouth Caring, and a lesser number to Dartmouth Citizens Advice, the Dartmouth Foodbank and other local causes which included Blackbird Wood and the Social Club. Some of these charities have had donations in the past e.g. CAB. Councilors suggested they might approach the Blackbird Wood and offer a councillor as a trustee as part of the s106 process.

Five responses were against any donations and some expressed concern that the precept was an involuntary tax. GC counselled that the response rate was low and this did not suggest a carte blanche to go ahead.

Resolved PH to draw up scenarios for December and set aside £750 toward local charities in 2023/24. This to be funded from the unspent budget on carbon neutral initiatives [£1,250]. The overall precept would have to be set against a backdrop of 10.1% CPI [September 2022] which may fall toward the middle of next year. The agenda for the meeting would be confined to setting the precept [and any urgent business].

He also reminded councillors that the Council should look at savings on current services. RC noted the road sweep acted to prevent further problems on the highway as it kept the road maintained. Weeds remained an issue but could be dealt with in another way. This contractor was a saving on the previous service. DR wondered if the dry weather meant weeds were less prevalent. Also it was difficult to assess responses and whether people are happy to continue with a contractor as most don't complain. LN observed maybe the contract for sweeping could be aligned better with other activity on the roads e.g. silage and harvest and GC thought maybe December. RC suggested the cycle could be run one month behind so June, September, December and April to accommodate the leaf fall. RC did not know what the likely contact price would be for 2023/24 yet.

1122/7 UPDATE ON CONTRACTS

JB informed the meeting that Meg Booth [Devon County Council head of transport] had advised him to contact Lisa Edmonds to discuss the proposed cyclic contract for road maintenance. **Resolved the Council to contact Lisa.**

1122/8 STRETE VILLAGE DAY PLANNING

It was noted the plans were well in train and people had volunteered to do certain tasks. The Pub will offer its services as well to include a bar.

1122/9 STRETE GATE AND THE MEMORIAL

Discussed above under the District councillor slot.

1122/10 SALE OF THE STRETE ESTATE

The sale was agreed, under exchange but not yet completed. Tenants will be contacted in due course. This will include the Parish Council as a tenant for the playpark land. **This was noted.**

1122/11 DISCUSSION OF VARIOUS LAND MATTERS

Pam Wills has emailed the Clerk a list of planned works on behalf of Blackbird Wood [Trust]. Where these are capital works, they can be considered for the s106 monies. SHDC has recommended the Trust look at grants to fund any tree replacement in the first instance as these are readily available **The Council can work with SHDC to arrange funding under the s106.**

A form needs to be completed and sent to Alexis Huggins at SHDC.

1122/12 OTHER ONGOING MATTERS IF NOT COVERED ELSEWHERE

Nothing to add.

1122/13 CLERK'S REPORT

Post Box on Hynetown Road. A new box has appeared. It awaits activation and can be used thereafter. **Noted.**

Bid to purchase playpark. Submitted to Savills on 14th August. Noted.

Banking. Met with Ian to activate his user but the password has expired. Another has been received and I will activate his user. We will need to change my user to someone else. Note.

Road safety measures. No change this month. The VAS machine remains with the Clerk who sent correspondence on to the County Councillor to chase up with Meg Booth. **To carry forward and note.**

Speed watch initiative. No change: police contact awaited. For information and action.

S106 monies. Have received a list of capital and revenue items off Pam Wills for the Blackbird Wood. To draft a report for SHDC to consider this for release of funds. **Noted.**

Hall broadband. Due to capacity issues with PlusNet the Clerk and PH are looking at either a PlusNet package with more data or another package e.g. Smarty ['3']. The Hall committee has offered to share 50:50 in any funding. **Noted**.

Warm spaces. The Clerk attended the first of these drop-ins on Tuesday 8th November at the Hall. There were nine people who turned up, mainly helpers and supporters. Soup made at the Pub [and donated] was served along with bread. Tea and coffee were available. There is another session planned for 22nd November. **Noted.**

Christmas tree. Ian asked if the arrangements for this could be passed on as he is very busy. He can buy and recharge the cost of a tree but if someone else could put it up and dress it that would be good. **Resolved RC will look at this and see if he can arrange for the tree to be put up and decorated.**

Locum clerk and recruitment. The SLCC was asked to supply a locum clerk for December and one response was received. There is an advert for a replacement Clerk in the local paper 17th and 24th November. **Resolved the Clerk to ask Gilly Claydon if she can recommend a locum for the December meeting.** The report was received.

1122/14 CHAIR'S REPORT

Report submitted before the meeting.

Strete Parish Council Chairman's report - November Meeting

Strete Estate The PC now understands that the estate has been sold as a whole, although the identity of the buyer remains unknown to us. The further implications of the sale of most of the land on the west side of the village is of grave concern to the PC, especially given the stance of the selling agent towards earmarking land for future development.

Bus Consultation by Devon County and new timetables In early November DCC published its revised bus service Enhanced Partnership Plan and Scheme, Transport websites - Devon CC - Enhanced Partnership Plan & Scheme v.5.0 FINAL 3.11.22.pdf - All Documents (sharepoint.com) Much of this document is devoted to describing and defining the new partnership arrangements that the County has struck with all the bus operators in Devon. It sets out service aspirations and long-term targets for transport across Devon, recognising that it is a very diverse county and includes cities with intensive population levels, market towns and sparsely populated rural areas, all of which have very differing transport needs. It sets out the public funding and subsidy proposals going forward.

In Strete, the main service of note is of course the Stagecoach 93 service linking us to Dartmouth and Kingsbridge. Two aspects of the new document seem likely to affect us here:- • Better affordability of travel fare reductions. DCC is subsidising the Devon Day Ticket which will be reduced in price to £6.60 (from £9.60) for an adult fare, allowing unlimited daily bus travel across multiple Bus Operators on the majority of bus services across the county. The long-term aim is to improve the use of buses and reduce car travel. • Better Carbon Outcomes through a modernised, cleaner bus fleet. DCC will commission a longer-term incremental decarbonisation strategy with a structured and costed delivery plan that sees DCC's ambition kept in step with emerging technologies and improvements in the performance of existing propulsion systems (e.g., electric and hydrogen).

There are currently no electric or hydrogen fuelled zero emission vehicles in the Devon bus fleet, and only 71% of the diesel fleet meets Euro VI or V emission standards. Average vehicle age in Devon is 9 years and bus fleets range between 3 and 15 years. This will be a difficult programme to execute and will require central government funding to achieve aspired levels of carbon reduction. Timetable changes to the service between Dartmouth and Plymouth serving Strete were implemented in October. The service has been hampered recently by the medium-term road closure of the A379 at Frogmore for road works. A shuttle service has been operating between Frogmore and Strete, meeting the 93 service which has been diverted via Totnes Road. It has been necessary to turn the shuttle bus around in Strete, and after some experimentation this has been happening at the entrance to Start Bay Park.

Slapton Line Partnership SHDC full council adopted the motion put forward by Cllrs Foss and Bastone (Dartmouth) on 14th July. The motion called for the Terms of Reference of the Slapton Line Partnership to be revised and for greater effort to be given to the preservation of the road across the line, at least until a viable and realistic alternative back route has been established. Since that point we have had no further information, and no meeting has been convened by SLP. The Parish Council has sent a number of formal letters to the Councils and the MP expressing our alarm at the lack of information and action. Proposed relocation of the Slapton Line Memorial In

early September Devin County Council submitted a planning application to remove the Memorial from the current site at Slapton Beach car park and relocate it on the land at Strete Gate owned by the Field Studies Council. This is despite the fact that the six Parishes have failed to reach agreement with the FSC about maintenance of the site. At the September Parish meeting Strete Parish Council agreed to submit a formal objection to the DCC planning application, and this has since caused some attention, although there is no further progress to report.

Waste Collections Waste collections by SHDC are now all carried out using 'in-house' Council labour, vehicles and facilities rather than being outsourced. The free 'brown bin' collection service ceased at the end of October. SHDC has announced the start of the new subscription service for green waste from March 23, inviting households to sign up before 22nd January to ensure they are registered for the start of the scheme .

Night Landing Site for the Devon Air Ambulance Nothing further to report. Police Hub Nothing further to report.

Post Box on Hynetown Road The good news is that Royal Mail installed a new post box on the pedestrian pathway outside the Village Hall in early November. This is a replacement for the old box which was summarily removed from a site on Hynetown Road in January. The new unit has not yet been commissioned.

Newsletter and referendum on the 2023/4 precept The responses to the referendum attached to the October newsletter have been received and counted, and the Parish Council will discuss them at the PC meeting on 17th November. The results will be published as an addenda to the meeting minutes.

Village Green A volunteer Parish Council working party is tackling the overgrown buddleia bushes in the wood.

Wi -Fi in the Village Hall The Village Hall Committee have agreed to a proposal from the PC to jointly fund an extension of the limited wi-fi arrangement currently provided by the PC for use during PC meetings. The new arrangement will allow unlimited use of the installed wi-fi by all users of the village hall 24/7. The cost is expected to be approx. £240 per annum and will be equally shared by the two organisations.

Additional Public Holiday – the King's Coronation. The Coronation of King Charles III will take place on Saturday 6th May 2023. Monday 8th May 2023 has been declared as an additional public holiday.

Strete Parish Clerk Very regrettably, Helen has announced her resignation from the post of Parish Clerk with effect from the end of November. On behalf of myself and all of the Parish Councillors I would like to acknowledge the huge contribution that Helen has made to the smooth running of Strete Parish Council in recent years, thank her for her efforts and wish her well in her future career. The post is currently being advertised for a replacement Clerk, and a locum will be arranged for the December meeting. Peter Hales, Chairman 15th November 2022.

The Chair's report was received.

1122/15 COUNCILLORS' REPORTS

Reports were circulated prior to the meeting. PH. This report was given under 1022/14.

KG. Slapton Line Partnership and AONB. Dear All As you know – there is nothing to report officially on SLP. However, the barrier at the Memorial car park has been taken down – giving access to the large motor homes. Also this last week on my tour around the Line area I discovered that one of the smaller motorhomes had been issued with a penalty ticket for staying in the Strete Gate carpark.

LN. Roads: hedges, and litter. There are no real problems on the roads although outside the village there is quite a lot of debris from leaves and general bad weather. Some stones have fallen out of the wall by Landcombe corner but the landowner knows about it. Some hedge cutting has been done and particularly Vicarage Lane looks much better. More hedge cutting will be done after Christmas. The milestones are fine.

DR. Health and safety, Parish Hall liaison. Parish Hall liaison. I recently attended a meeting of the parish hall committee when the following points were discussed. The subject of using the hall by the police was raised again as to date there had been no real proposal. It had been suggested that the police have one key to access all village halls which would not be acceptable to the hall insurance company, and no information has been received on costings. It was decided to wait for more information. Wednesday 16th November at 7.00pm will be the first meeting of those people wanting to help with Village Day 2023. As many people as possible are encouraged to attend. The hall committee agreed to a 50% contribution towards the charges for the provision of increased broad band in the hall. Information for those people wishing to contribute towards a '12 days of Christmas' food box which is being organised by two local Dartmouth residents, has been displayed at the Post Office.

Warm space/hot food. The first of the proposed events took place on Tuesday 8th November, when homemade soup and roll, and a hot drink were available, but unfortunately only one person made use of the facility. The next one will take place on the 22nd November. Snow Warden. I have recently heard from the 'snow tzar' and confirmed my availability to be the snow warden for the forthcoming winter, which I am sure you're all pleased to hear. I will be checking on all the salt/grit bins in the next few weeks.

Defibrillator. Following on from the very successful defibrillator training evening, I have received from Kevin Bowyer, the South West Ambulance co-ordinator, that our current agreement for the defibrillator, will be due for renewal on the 31st October 2023. The cost of a further four-year agreement will be the same as in 2019, which was £1800.00 plus VAT.

IC. Rights of Way, Tree warden, Strete Gate and Playpark. Playpark:- Virtually nothing to report about the playpark, other than a couple of previously 'noted' minor faults....E.g. gate closure springs, a few fittings missing from the skateboard ramp, And a small amount of decay in some climbing-apparatus timbers. Grass is reasonably short, but could maybe do with a cut before Winter sets in.

Strete Gate:- The car park has recently been 'treated' to a good 'brush-up', to remove a lot of pine needle debris. There has been quite a lot of camper-van activity in this area over the last few weeks, but fairly quiet, with no disrespectful behaviour, to my knowledge.

Footpaths/Rights of Way:- The only obvious problem, has been a large, fallen Sycamore tree over Prideaux lane, at the bottom, near Severn's Cottages. It came during the gales a few weeks ago, but the area is passable.

The Land agents that have, hither-to, dealt with the Strete Estate, are aware of the problem, and are awaiting their usual team of tree surgeons to deal with it. The rest of the paths seem OK.

Tree Warden:- Apart from the casualty tree mentioned above, I am unaware of any tree issues at present.

RC. Planning and Neighbourhood Plan, road maintenance including sweeping and Kings Arms liaison. PC Report November 2022

Neighbourhood Plan. There is nothing to report this month.

The Kings Arms. Hugh Macken has agreed to take on the role as Operations Manager in an unpaid temporary capacity until the spring 2023 with the objective of improving communications and operational activities with all the front of house staff. October sales fell short of budget. Poor weather contributed to poor sales. Sales on some days failed to achieve the breakeven position, particularly on Tuesdays. In the first week of November, lunch time sales were insufficient to sustain regular opening. The pub continues to plan weekly events and is also offering guest beers and ciders including the popular Jail Ale and Vintage Cider. With Christmas dinners to look forward to from 1st December as well as a packed calendar of events that includes Strete Village Lunch, Quizzes, Book Club, Card Games and Music Nights there is a lot to look forward to from a visit to the pub. Enjoy the warmth of the pub with friends over a drink and/or lunch/supper.

Totnes Road Gateway Scheme. Regrettably Devon Highways have not installed the survey cables across the highway during the first week of November as advised in the email received on 26/09/2022. This survey is required by Devon Highways to obtain sufficient evidence to support a proposed gateway scheme aimed at reducing road users speed as they enter the village and respecting the 20mph speed limit into the village from Manor Farm camp site. A request for an update in this matter was submitted to the Neighbourhood Highway Officer for Devon Highways on 10/11/2022, but no response has been received to date.

GC. Village Green, Prideaux Lane, campervans and carparks, social care and Slapton Line partnership. Village Green. Grass cutting. Not a great deal to report. Field was cut but needs cutting again. Grass will no doubt grow until the weather gets colder. Wall repair was completed and all the spoil removed efficiently. Pruning in the copse to take place on 15th November.

GC to confirm with local 'observers' tractor has done the cuts promised.

SLP issues remain as before. **Citizens Advice** will be beginning a second session each week at the Children's Centre, which is situated in front of the Dartmouth Academy building. This is convenient because there is a good car park. Day and times to be decided. The existing session at the Community Cafe on Mondays 10 - 2 continues. Reports were received.

1122/16 REFERENDUM ON DISCRETIONARY EXPENDITURE FOR 2023/24 TO BE ADDED TO THE PRECEPT This was covered above.

1122/17 CORRESPONDENCE: All correspondence has been circulated.

1122/18 OTHER BUSINESS: The councillors presented the Clerk who was leaving with flowers and chocolates. She thanked them and commended them for their unpaid service as councillors.

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SHELLBACKS THE TAND THE

BLUE NOSES

Paying respects to King Neptune

From the Equator, an imaginary line around the middle of the Earth halfway between the North and South Poles dividing the Earth into the Northern and Southern Hemispheres, to the dark cold wild waters of the Arctic

'Crossing the Line' is one of the oldest traditions in the Royal Navy and takes place when a ship crosses the equator.

Royal Navy tradition dictates that any ship crossing the equator must pay its respects to the Lord of the Seas, King Neptune, to gain his acceptance. The ceremony involves sailors being tested to ensure they are capable of 'handling rough seas' and can see them being painted, fed a less than appetising snacks and being dunked in sea water.

Members of crew who had never previously 'crossed the line' – and a few extras – are 'charged with crimes' and get the justice they deserve in a comical fashion turning them into a trusty 'Shellback' after proving themselves in front of King Neptune.

Neptune's Royal Court is steeped in tradition, set rituals, grandiose speeches, elaborate costumes and props – and is usually led by King Neptune, with his consort, Amphitrite, and assistant, Davy Jones. Those who have not yet crossed are known as "pollywogs." After crossing the equator they become "shellbacks," or trusted subjects of Neptune. Aircraft carrier HMS Queen Elizabeth sailed in the southern hemisphere for the first time, marking passing the equator with a traditional 'Crossing the Line' ceremony.

By the eighteenth century, there were wellestablished line-crossing rituals in the British Royal Navy. On the voyage of HMS Endeavour to the Pacific in 1768, captained by James Cook, Joseph Banks described how the crew drew up a list of everyone on board, including cats and dogs, and interrogated them as to whether they had crossed the equator. If they had not, they must choose to give up their allowance of wine for four days, or undergo a ducking ceremony in which they were ducked three times into the ocean. According to Banks, some of those ducked were "grinning and exulting in their hardiness", but others "were almost suffocated". In the 18th century and earlier, the linecrossing ceremony was quite a brutal event, often involving beating pollywogs with boards and wet ropes and sometimes throwing the victims over the side of the ship, dragging the pollywog through the surf from the stern. In more than one instance, sailors were reported to have been killed while participating in a line-crossing ceremony.

Crossing the Line -

EARNING MY BLUE NOSE CERTIFICATE

On the 1st of January 1958 I was just 17 days from my 20th birthday when we slipped our moorings in Chatham Dockyard and headed for the dark cold wild waters of the Arctic.

Instead of turning left into the North Sea we turned right into the English Channel passing what will become my home in South Devon in over 50 years' time.

Rounding Start Point, the Lizard, Lands' End we turned North heading for Londonderry via the Irish Sea to refuel before our long journey to the Greenland Sea and Barents Sea to watch over the fishing fleets of Europe.

There was no ceremony as we crossed the Arctic Circle, we had no time to think of crossing the equator in a hot climate as we struggled to keep upright in a Force 8 gale in near permanent darkness heading for the Norwegian port of Tromso our base for the next few weeks.


The next few weeks saw us steaming over the top of Norway into the freezing waters of the Barents Sea calling into the ports of Hammerfest, Vadso, and Kirkeness, we looked after and assisted the fishing boats when the weather allowed us, we also had the problem of Black Ice that made us look like a floating Iceberg that had to be chipped off by hand.

It was when we headed for Greenland that we hit a gale of all gales a Storm Force 11, three fishing boats were lost in the gigantic waves one hitting us on the foredeck splitting the breakwater and flooding the forward mess decks which had to A battered HMS Lennox arrives

be abandoned and all watertight doors shut tight. When we could we turned to port and headed south to the only port that could take a battered ship, Amsterdam where we licked our wounds and gave thanks for our lives.

A couple of weeks later we received out Blue Nose Certificate, I think we definitely earned it.

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
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

Toodles is named for my two dogs that started my journey into grooming. It is an amalgamation of their recorded breeds; a

Tibetan Terrier and a Miniature Poodle. When I first got my two rescue dogs, Poppy & Charlie, I knew nothing about grooming. The dogs I had grown up with were short haired, bathed at home and had their nails checked at the vets. Now I was responsible for pups with very different coats and I needed help.

I quickly found out that grooming salons and parlours were out of reach to the average dog owner. We were to drop off our dogs at the front desk, from where they would be whisked away to back rooms or basements. For the first few years as an owner, I gained little knowledge or understanding of grooming.

When I moved back to South Hams, I had a reduced teaching schedule and with time available I signed up for a series of evening courses. I realised that there is so much more to grooming and even the way I wash my dogs can affect their skin and coat heath. The more I learned the more I wanted to learn and the following year I started my formal training.

Like me, you may be shocked to know that there are no legal requirements for any qualifications to open your own salon, nor does your business have to be registered with any professional body. I look back at some of the places I left my pups and feel so guilty, but it's hard to question the status quo.

When I opened my own salon, I wanted it to be open to my owners. Owners should be able to stay with their dog, inspect the cleanliness of the salon, ask about relevant qualifications, and get advice on grooming at home. In short, groomers and owners should be working together for the well-being of our dogs. Our shop grew out of this need as we looked to source high quality tools, shampoos, restraints, food and accessories for our owners. Buying online may be cheaper, but the value of getting expert advice and guidance in 1to1 sessions is priceless. Sam & the Toodles Team

Pistachio Oat Squares, vegan & gluten free

Ingredients

1 cup raw shelled pistachios

1 cup rolled oats

1/2 teaspoon sea salt

1/4 cup maple syrup, more for drizzling on top

2 tablespoons olive oil

1/3 cup unsweetened coconut flakes

Additional handful of chopped pistachios for the top

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 170 C and line an 8-inch square tin with parchment paper, leaving two paper flaps on either side of the tin.
- 2. In a food processor, with the S blade attached, whizz together the pistachios, oats and salt for about 30 seconds, until a meal-type consistency starts to form. Drizzle in the maple syrup and olive oil while the food processer is still running. Continue until the mixture begins to come together into a crumbly, almost-wet dough.
- 3. Press the dough evenly into the tin and cover it with coconut flakes and the remaining pistachios. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes until the coconut is golden brown and the dough is cooked through.
- 4. Carefully lift the cooled, now cooked, dough out of the tin by holding the two sides of parchment paper. Cut into squares. Drizzle a little maple syrup over the top for extra sweetness.
