OPERATION TIGER WEEKEND

On the morning of 27th April, Strete Village Hall hosted a morning of remembrance. Paul Potgieter showed two films:

EVACUATION and OPERATION TIGER.

EVACUATION was made several years ago by local man, IAN PHILLIPS, and it followed the lives of some local inhabitants before, during and after the evacuation.

The most poignant part of the next film, OPERATION TIGER, was the long list of names of Americans killed during the exercise.

After the films, Paul and Steve Mutton, answered questions and provided extra facts concerning Operation Tiger.

For the following six weeks after the exercise, all information had to be kept secret so the Germans did not know when and where there might be an invasion, D-Day.

It was a very moving experience to see the films and learn more about the whole operation.

Unveiling of the Exercise Tiger Memorial Cairn Strete Gate, commemorating the loss of over 100 US personnel during the first Exercise Tiger landing on Slapton Sands 06.30 27th April 1944.



US troops made their first exercise Tiger landings at 6.30 on the 27th April 1944. They came ashore from LSTs/Higgins boats on 'Red Beach' near the middle and end of the Slapton Ley, near Strete Gate.

The morning turned out to be a shambles! There were altered timings, bad communications, live ammunition unbeknown to defenders and those coming ashore and a bombardment from a cruiser and destroyers lying off-shore coinciding with the a landing of troops on the beach that should have been delayed.

The result was the loss of 110 lives but due to the essential security around D-Day being only five weeks away the fate of these US servicemen, their bodies and identities were carefully spirited away. But there were witnesses and observers even General Eisenhower noted the losses.


Thanks to some four years of research by Teddy Cranmer to establish the facts and campaigning we now have a memorial cairn to acknowledge this tragic loss of life.





Unfortunately, due to ill health Teddy Cranmer could not attend the dedication of the memorial but his daughter was able to record several heartfelt thanks for his hard work and dedication in making the memorial to the tragic loss of over 100 US service men a reality.





Exercise Tiger was one of the larger exercises that took place in April and May 1944.

The first practice assault at Strete Gate took place on the morning of 27 April and was marked by an incident involving friendly fire.

The day after the first practice assaults, early on the morning of 28 April, the exercise was blighted when Convoy T-4, consisting of eight LSTs carrying vehicles and combat engineers of the 1st Engineer Special Brigade, was attacked by German E-boats in Lyme Bay.

9 German E-boats attacked the line of LSTs resulting in 749 deaths in total, many men drowned or died of hypothermia in the cold sea while waiting to be rescued.

Kings Arms

Welcome to our community pub on the South Devon coast.



On the 27th May we are belatedly celebrating three years of community ownership of our village pub and we hope as many of our supporters as possible will be able to come and enjoy the party from noon.

Having just passed our financial year end, we are pleased to share some provisional figures with you. Despite a 13.5% increase in over-

heads, we've reduced our overall losses from £50k to £47k. This achievement is really great news, and is down to tighter management of staff costs, reducing waste, and introducing regular events such as quiz nights, open mic, spoken word, and bingo, all of which have helped to increase sales. We continue to work hard to increase trade and bolster profits.

However, there is a general downturn in the hospitality industry causing many pubs, cafes and restaurants to close, and coupled with the cost of living crisis, and increased staff and energy costs, the Kings Arms will require additional funding for the foreseeable future to underwrite expected losses of around £40k-£50k annually. In order to meet the inevitable shortfall, we are launching a multi-pronged fundraising effort to ensure the future of our pub.

The village wants to keep the pub open - it is important to most for many different reasons - so we are introducing a subscription scheme. We believe this is a fair way of sharing the cost and, hopefully, an affordable means to contribute. There will be three subscription levels: 'Bronze' at £10, 'Silver' at £20, and 'Gold' at £30 per month. There is no minimum commitment, and direct debits can be cancelled at any time. (These payment levels are on par with many other commonly-used subscription services such as Netflix and Spotify, and publications such as Gardeners World and many newspapers; and the more premium subscription services like SKYSports or Naked Wines.) Instinctively, you may expect that the different levels should afford different levels of privilege, but that would cause unintended consequences in running the scheme, it would detract from the benefits to the pub, and it is not what this scheme is about. Multiples of relatively small monthly payments, with people paying what they can reasonably afford, will help keep the pub afloat, keeping this essential part of village life alive.

We will be making a registration form available shortly with a direct debit mandate, and we hope that you'll seriously consider registering to help secure the ongoing success of our village local.

Secondly, we will be running several fundraising campaigns throughout the year with high value prizes. This will enable us to target fundraising from a much wider audience and spread the load beyond the village. With this in mind, we are actively seeking a willing volunteer to help manage and coordinate this crucial element of fundraising.

This need not be a permanent committee role if that suits the person concerned. If anyone is keen to get involved we would very much like to hear from you.

As before, we will, of course, approach local benefactors and businesses, for whom preserving the pub within the village is important.

We feel it's only right to be open and honest with everyone who has an interest in keeping the Kings Arms open. We understand that many of you have already contributed a considerable amount. The committee has worked tirelessly to ensure sound management of the business, but in the face of the brutal economic reality facing pubs in rural areas we have no other option but to raise additional funds to offset inevitable trading losses. If we don't, we fear that the pub might close before our 4th anniversary. Imagine the village without it!

The Kings Arms serves as a gathering place where friends and family come together. Our pub hosts local events, and provides a warm, welcoming atmosphere that is integral to the fabric of our village life. It is a place where people can connect, unwind, and feel a sense of belonging. The absence of our lovely pub would create a void that would be deeply felt.

So we hope you'll join us in celebrating our 3rd anniversary and crucially, consider contributing further to preserve this essential part of our village life, ensuring that The Kings Arms can continue to provide a place of warmth, camaraderie, and sense of community.

Nottingham Catchfly Project

from The Habitat Group

The Habitat Group is a collection of people from different parishes in the South Hams who are concerned by the loss of our local biodiversity, but are convinced that we can help turn it around by creating wildlife friendly habitats. Whether it is a garden, a verge, a field or a window box, if we simply refrain from using pesticides and make our patch welcoming to wildlife, then nature quickly starts to move back in.

We're working on our own gardens and fields and spreading ideas as far and as wide as we can of how we can reverse that loss. Whether it's planting wildflowers, making ponds, feeding birds, creating log piles or simply not mowing our lawn so often, it's all helping to turn the tide.

Our mission statement is "To improve the biodiversity of our parish and the surrounding areas through the gradual development of a variety of sustainable habitats" and that says it in a nutshell.

Some of you may remember that last year The Habitat group were encouraging us all to plant the beautiful, night-flowering Nottingham Catchfly in our gardens. The idea springs from the Devon Local Nature Partnership, which has drawn up a list of threatened plants and animals which it is thought we in Devon might have some chance of helping survive. The UK is, believe it or not, one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world and although that thought is depressing and a little overwhelming, there are small things we can all do. It has been recently discovered that moths may well be as important, or even more important than bees as pollinators. The plan lists several moths but we are chiefly concerned here with the White Spot moth for whom Nottingham Catchfly is the sole food plant. The White Spot moth is on the verge of extinction in the UK but Devon is one of the areas where small populations are thought to cling on.

Nottingham Catchfly plants need care in their first year (chiefly they don't want to be

thugged out by other lush Devon vegetation) but once the root system is established - perhaps in a large pot at first - they can be easily divided and shared around to make a good size patch. If you have plants, now is the time to divide them and spread them around or share them with friends. If not, they are readily available as 'plugs' from various wildflower seed companies such as Landlife Wildflowers and others.

For those plant enthusiasts who want to know more, the Bladder Campion is from the same Silene family and similarly a very important moth plant, less endangered but still in need of our protection.

Even if we don't entice the shy Whitespot moth to Blackawton and South Hams, many other beneficial and interesting insects love the Catchfly and you too will enjoy its delicate scent on a warm summer night. **suehadow@gmail.com**

White Spot Hadena albimacula

A very local species, occurring on shingle beaches and chalk or limestone sea-cliffs on the south coast of England. The adults are on the wing in June and July, and are attracted to light as well as certain flowers.

The larval foodplant is Nottingham catchfly (*Silene nutans*), the caterpillars feeding on the seeds at night, and descending to hide amongst the shingle during the day.

Nottingham Catchfly is easily recognizable by its white, deeply split petals and its tufted growth habit. In bright sunshine, the petals look rolled up and withered.

Only in the evening and at night do they spread out. It has a hyacinth scent that attracts moths. It benefits from grazing. The common name Nottingham catchfly commemorates the former occurrence of *S. nutans* on the walls of Nottingham Castle, and the species was chosen to represent the unitary authority of Nottingham as its county flower.

Greenspace mowed grass today. Greenspace had not been instructed to mow the grass and SPC were awaiting a new contract price before making an agreement. Price provided today is £50 per cut, which is approximately 30% less than current contractor. Councillors agreed that GC will instruct Greenspace and contact previous contractor to terminate contract. No evidence of mole hills. Price provided to vibration role football pitch area is £350.00. SPC agreed to the price and agreed that GC will instruct Greenspace to go ahead and roll the area.

Action: Insurance policy to be reviewed in May. Clerk to check that new equipment is covered.

7. ROAD SAFETY

Locality budget approval process discussed. Programme of work would need to be created and then submitted to Julian Brazil.

8. SLAPTON LINE PARTNERSHIP

No new meetings have been announced. (Note: - Devon Highways representatives attended the Annual Parish Meeting to explain the approach to improving back-road connectivity between local Parishes in the event of a breach of the road over Slapton Line.

9. CYCLICAL DRAINAGE WORKS.

IC reported that 3 out of 14 buddle holes have been cleared by County. They should all be done more frequently than annually, and it again raises the question about the extent of the work programme that Highways is providing.

PH reported that SPC cannot expect cyclical maintenance budget from DCC, the offer made in 22/23 financial year has been withdrawn.

Action: Clerk to speak to clerk at Blackawton about how they are funding lengthsmans duties.

13. CLERK'S REPORT

Invitations were sent out for the Annual Parish Meeting.

Requests for contributions to hedge cutting costs sent to residents, nearly half of the payments requested have been received to date.

Mandate sent to Lloyds Bank requesting access to view the current account online, Helen Darch is kindly downloading the bank statements in the interim.

I attended the Stokenham Parish Meeting on Tuesday 16th April. Gill Claydon kindly provided some advice for clerking this evenings meeting. Roger English provided a comprehensive summary of the work of the Slapton Line Partnership to date and provided sound reasoning for the current twin track approach. Suggestions made by the public for alternates such as a bridge across the back of the ley were made by highways believed that the funding required would not be granted. The Stokenham Parish Council Meeting strongly advised that Port Lane should be added as an alternate route to the road on which Stokenham Area Primary School is located. Concerns were raised over HGVs using the routes and questions were raised over how large vehicles access could be restricted without impacting use by agricultural vehicles.

SHDC have requested proof of payment for the invoices from Yates, C Ellis and the playpark inspector. The invoice for the playpark inspection will be approved an paid at the SPC meeting and then then bank statements can be submitted. On receipt SHDC will release the remaining grant funds.

His Majesty's portrait was delivered to the village hall for display.

Brendan Spokes of Strete Estate was not able to attend the APM but has kindly accepted our invitation to present to the council at the July meeting. Nick Hindmarsh of Dartmouth Caring will also be attending a future meeting to discuss the organisations work.

Although Strete Village Day is a long way off in August, monthly meetings have started to discuss and agree the content for the event and to ensure there is sufficient support available on the day.

Various organisations in the village are invited to attend these meetings as funds raised on the day will be shared with some of those organisations who are able to put forward beneficial proposals for Strete community. This is an important fund-raising event for the Village Hall.

Village Sweeping and Road Works

Norns Lane to Blackpool Sands road works, previously notified as taking place in March, has been postponed until April sometime. Formal date notification to be advised.

Despite several requests for dialogue to obtain annual funding from Devon CC to enable Strete PC to undertake the highway deficiencies in the parish – there has been limited response.

Pothole and general surface on the A379 (Priority Road) at the junction with Totnes Road (outside the Post Office and Shop) has seen nothing happen after repeated instances of uploading this to the Devon CC 'Report a Problem' website. This is a Category 1 defect that should be actioned for repair in 7-days.

As a result, pothole repairs are still hit and miss and everyone is encouraged to report them on Devon Highways 'Report a Problem' website https://www.devon.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/report-a-problem/

There is hope that Devon CC will actively progress the need to protect Slapton Line whilst at the same time pursuing the need to improve the infrastructure of three-mile lane to effectively and efficiently manage road user movements as traffic volumes increase. This will take time!!

Added: sign at Strete Gate not fully visible due to vegetation. VAS machine not visible due to campervan permanent parked blocking visibility. Councillors to review option for re-siting. Attempts have been made to contact van owner to ask that it is moved but no response. Official letter to be written on grounds that blocking visibility of VAS is anti-social. Previous chef at Kings Arm and chef who use to work at Seahorse in Dartmouth have agreed to come as a guest chef.

Graham Campbell -April 2024

The village field is in generally good condition. There is an ongoing problem with an animal digging up clumps of turf. It seems most likely that this is a dog, but we have no information about whose dog. It could be a badger, though I had thought that all local badgers had been eliminated by the cull. There is a small bit of damage to one of the picnic tables – not structural but annoying. I think filler and a touch up with wood stain is the best solution. A parishioner has suggested the ivy should be removed from the old well. There are mixed feelings about this as ivy is a great source of food for birds in the winter period. To discuss.

We met the grass cutting contractor at the playpark to look at the state of the grass.

He will quote for cutting the grass as part of his current contract, and his new machine is ideal for the job. He notes that the moles would need to be removed first and then he will quote also to roll the grass to eliminate much of the uneven quality of the surface that parishioners have remarked on. We need to decide on who removes the moles.

This would be an additional cost for rolling and mole catching.

The new roundabout was inspected and a few adjustments were recommended and were made by the Ellis family.

I note that the new path in Blackbird wood is easy to walk on, but the broken gatepost remains broken and the gate is very difficult for people to open and shut. The Trust has plans to do that but after 18months of being broken this is not a priority it seems.

Ian Cumberlidge PC Report - March 2024

Apologies for "skidding in on rubber heels".. Have gone from being "laid up with leg probs" to running around to "catch up"...!!

Have just 'got off the phone ' talking to Teddy Cranmer re 'Cairn', but I rang him to see how he is 'doing'.. He seems remarkably "Chipper" & fairly "full of beans"..! He was very appreciative of Strete PC's support, and asked me to pass on his "Thanks".

The Play area is being cut as I bash the Keyboard, and I can report that the roundabout has been 'quite a hit' and has been used a lot..! The various necessary repairs to equipment are ongoing, and I should pick up the replacement safety bars for climbing apparatus within the hour..!

Added: Checked footpaths and bridleways and most have dried out. Strete Gate busy with large campers on corner, almost blocking access. IC will speak to Brendan Spokes about adding additional post to protect the cairn.

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

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
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"CREATURES OF THE NIGHT"

On arrival in Poland, she shared a hotel room with another female driver of the 39 in the convoy. They had a blue light police escort for the last part of their journey, but could not have their mobile phones, for security reasons.

In the basement of the hotel was the bomb shelter, not a bit like the ones we see here, in fact quite luxurious. Fortunately, they did not have to use this.

When they reached their destination, they handed over the contents and, if I recall

correctly, most of the vehicles to the Military.

Before their departure at the hotel for their homeward journey they held an auction between all the drivers to raise money for the cause with a Ukrainian flag signed by all the drivers which raised £2000 plus various other prizes given by some of the drivers e.g. stay in their castle in Scotland, a guitar altogether they raised £20,000



The pick up they drove they did bring back as her co driver wanted to go again with incubators for babies which he had been given from a hospital here in England.

She was thanked by Joan and a box went around for anyone wishing to put something in it for the cause. Asked if she would do it again, she said YES.
