

A special coronation commemorative service was arranged by the churchwardens of St Michael's, Trish Robinson and Vincent Dingley.

The church was beautifully decorated with the theme of red, white and blue being reflected in the flowers and the beautifully designed order of service. The pedestal by the font, arranged by Dorothy Teal, was stunning.

Vincent led the happy and imaginative celebration which incorporated some of the King's passions and interests. The service began with Trish on violin and Karen White on piano playing the beautiful "Apres un reve" by Gabriel Faure. In the form of a dream, it reflects two imaginary lovers who are head over heels in love before being brought back to harsh reality as they awake. I wonder if King Charles is looking at the harsh reality of his role now that his "dream" has come true?

More references To the King were made through a reading by Emily Robertson of "The Boy who would be King" by Michael Morpurgo and a beautiful poem "A Curlew Calls" narrated by Trudy Rothwell. The curlew is the King's favourite bird and the poem by Richard Longstaff seemed particularly apt.

Richard Soans read an enlightening poem by the Dalai Lama "The Paradox of our age" which highlighted the fact that although we have so many things today, our lives are in some ways more empty and poorer. Richard also read out a very clever piece "Quoting Shakespeare" originally written by Bernard Levin. Shakespeare is a great favourite of the King and this reading starkly illustrated just how many phrases we use in everyday conversation not realising or appreciating their derivation.

Ukraine is of course still very much in our thoughts, and it was very special to have a Ukrainian citizen, Volodya, to lead "A prayer for Ukraine".

Everybody enjoyed the coffee, cake and a chat after the service where we could reflect on the wonderful occasion we have witnessed and just how lucky we are to have such a wonderful church and churchwardens. **Nick Shepherd**


King Charles III was crowned in this country as our earthly king we must remember as he did that it is Jesus Christ who is proclaimed as the King of kings and Lord of lords.

**4th April:** With Dorothy leading our social club this afternoon we were pleased to welcome Sam, a chiropodist, who trades under the name of 'Feet First'.

Sam came into this profession later in life and set up her mobile chiropody practice and does a session in the clinic at Dartmouth.

She began her talk by informing us of the number of bones in our feet and how important our feet are to us and sadly the part of our body that does get neglected. Good feet starts from babyhood and how important it is to wear the correct shoes from the start which could alleviate any problems as we get older. Some feet problems can be hereditary.



She answered a lot of questions like fungal nail infections and the different kinds of treatment that was available and how to look after the feet to avoid this and athletes

foot. She showed us a gadget, that was quite cheap and available on the internet, which had a towelling head and used to dry between the toes so no moisture is left which fungal infections thrive on. How do you put your socks on when you can no longer get down to do this was one question asked. The answer being you can purchase gadgets to assist with this. One member explain how a common plastic carrier bag with handles could be used a very economical way to help with this problem.

At the end of her session she gave each member present a 'goody bag' with a pen, foot shaped key ring and a moisturised wipe along with her business card. A very interesting afternoon when members learnt a lot about our feet. She was thanked by Joan after which Colleen and Chris served our welcome cups of tea.





#### **Hosepipe Ban**

The South West Water region is still seeing the impact of last year's exceptionally dry weather and reservoir levels are lower than normal for this time of year. South West Water is acting now to protect water resources and the environment, to help rivers and reservoirs to recharge ahead of the summer months.

#### There are however Discretionary exceptions:

Customers who meet the criteria below for a Discretionary Exception can continue to use water without having to make representation to South West Water Limited to receive permission to use water for the following restricted uses. It is requested that customers that meet the requirements for a Discretionary Exception use water wisely and adopt water efficient practices.

The criteria for a Discretionary Exception include:

Watering a garden attached to a domestic dwelling, or watering plants on domestic premises using a hosepipe by people who hold a Blue Badge or by people registered to our Priority Services Register, or on our WaterSure tariff for medical reasons

Cleaning a private motor-vehicle using a hosepipe or specific low water use apparatus such as pressure washers by people who hold a Blue Badge or by people registered to our Priority Services Register, or on our WaterSure tariff for medical reasons

Cleaning walls, or windows, of domestic premises using a hosepipe by people who hold a Blue Badge or by people registered to our Priority Services Register, or on our WaterSure tariff for medical reasons

Cleaning paths or patios, or other artificial outdoor surfaces, using a hosepipe by people who hold a Blue Badge or by people registered to our Priority Services Register, or on our WaterSure tariff for medical reasons

Filling or maintaining a domestic pond using a hosepipe by people who hold a Blue Badge or by people registered to our Priority Services Register, or on our WaterSure tariff for medical reasons

Use of an approved drip or trickle irrigation watering system, fitted with a pressure reducing valve and a timer, that are not handheld, that place water drip by drip directly onto the soil surface or beneath the soil surface, without any surface run off or dispersion of water through the air using a jet or mist

Commercial customers that use hosepipes in the course of their day-to-day cleaning business operation (for example hand car washing, window cleaning, graffiti removal), excluding the watering of domestic gardens

Cleaning a private motor vehicle using specific low water use apparatus such as pressure washers

Watering food crops at domestic premises or private allotments using a hosepipe Watering newly laid turf using a hosepipe for the first 28 days

Watering newly-bought plants for the first 14 days

Cleaning a private leisure boat using a hosepipe to remove graffiti

Cleaning a private leisure boat using a hosepipe to prevent or control the spread of nonnative and/or invasive species

Filling or maintaining an ornamental fountain to operate water features with religious significance

Filling or maintaining a new domestic swimming pool

Filling or maintaining a domestic swimming or paddling pool with covers to minimise evaporative losses when not in use

Filling or maintaining a domestic swimming or paddling pool with water conservation and/or recycling systems approved by South West Water

Filling or maintaining a domestic swimming pool that is subject to significant repair and renovation

Cleaning walls or windows of domestic premises using a hosepipe for the removal of graffiti or where very low water use technologies are employed and approved by South West Water

Cleaning paths or patios or other artificial outdoor surfaces using a hosepipe for the removal of graffiti or where very low water use technologies are employed and approved by South West Water.

#### How do I water my garden if I can't use a hosepipe?

Watering your garden can be done in many different ways, and is best done in the very early morning or at dusk when it is much cooler.

You can water your garden with:

- Tap water using watering cans
- Greywater from washing up and showers (soap doesn't affect the health of your plants)
- Rainwater collected in barrels, waterbutts and even troughs! You can connect a hosepipe to a water butt (if the pressure will allow).
- You may water 'standard' trees planted in the last three planting seasons that cannot reasonably be hand-watered, or watered with non-potable water. A 'standard' tree is a tree with a single stem with clear trunk [no side branches] for at least 1.8m above the ground.
- You may use a hosepipe to water newly laid turf in domestic gardens for 28 days after planting/laying. This is to help it establish, and not doing so would affect the health and condition of the grass. To be able to water for the 28 days, you must be able to provide evidence of when the turf was laid. Failure to do so, and/or watering for longer than 28 days will be considered a breach of the ban.

#### COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

Julian Brazil entered at 8.50 and gave his apologies; he had been in an election meeting at Follaton House. He reported that here is nothing new to add since March, the extra money for roads of £9 million received from government was still far short of the estimated £180 million which is what is needed to repair the major backlog of work. JB suggested that the PC should put together a wish list of works, but the best option would be to put forward works on the A379.

NALC affiliation fee £142.27 (Cheque to be raised)

Cheque raised for £500.00 Begin by Starting CiC (River Gara Water Vole Project)

Action Point Linda to collate and write cheques ready for signature prior for next month PCM – LF (c)Monitoring

The unaudited annual statement for 2022/23 was provided by Helen Darch and reviewed. The following points were noted:

Grass cutting. Greenspace annual cost was estimated at £3210 last May, but at the end of the financial year it is £1667 under spent. Invoices for approximately another £1600 still need to be submitted (nothing has been received since last summer). Action Points:-(i) Helen/Linda to make provision to carry forward on cash flow. (ii) GC to write to Greenspace and request they submits their back invoices in order to clear payments.

Mark Rowe invoices (the road sweeping contract), still no PC cheques have been presented for payment to the bank, despite being sent out months ago. – Action Point: RC offered to chase.

Buddle Holes – it was noted that costs for this item have increased significantly, and this was well over-budget in 22/23. PH noted that a formal tender will need to be undertaken by the new PC, and with a view to this, 95% of the regular maintenance work has been collated and mapped as a scope of work.

#### (d) 2023/24 Budget situation

It was agreed by the Councillors that the 23/24 budget as formulated for the precept did not need to be altered at the present time but would need to review and adjustment after the summer.

#### (e) Strete Indoor Bowls Club

A letter had been received requesting a contribution towards the cost of £3000 to replace the bowling mats. The letter pointed out the social benefits that the club brought to the village and expressed the hope that replacement equipment would help draw in new members. The PC unanimously agreed that a contribution of £500 would be made. Peter Hales would write to confirm. Cheque to be raised.

#### 6) UPDATE ON CONTRACTS - None

#### 7) VILLAGE DAY and CORONATION DAY

There was no update on Village Day preparations.

Re the Coronation Celebrations, RC reported that a full weekend of events is planned at the Kings Arms as previously discussed. Tickets are still available at the pub for the King's Supper on the Saturday.

- **8) SLAPTION LINE PARTNERSHIP** KG, Face to face talks with Anthony Magnall were postponed. Nothing further to report. Remove from the standing agenda.
- **9) STRETE GATE & MEMORIAL** Slapton Memorial nothing further to report. PH felt that there would never be an agreement between the Parishes and Field Studies Council the Councillors agreed to take the item off the standing agenda.
- **10) SECTION 106 LAND MATTERS** LN, said she had a conversation with Pam and no application has been submitted yet, PH suggested we start to look at possible improvements to the playpark, as things are more settled now with land ownership and we should be more comfortable to invest. **Action Point.** IC to investigate further.

DR offered to run the lawn mower over the grass as it needed a cut, it was far to long for the children to play ballgames on. DR just needs confirmation that it will be OK to borrow the large mower first.

#### 11) OTHER MATTERS NOT COVERED ELSEWHERE

**Litter Picking.** LN said she was willing to continue to head up the village litter picking, despite standing down from the PC. Currently the village borrow tools from a third party. It was suggested that the village needs its own tools – a cost of around £180.00 + VAT for 5 tools. It was agreed that Louise could purchase and claim back via expenses and submit a VAT invoice addressed to Strete PC. The invoice needs to be made out to Strete Parrish Council in-order to reclaim back the VAT. The PC would pick up 50% of the invoice. Currently, the PC has nowhere to store tools or files. In the interim periods Louise was happy to store the tools, but PH is to approach Penny Penhale with a view to storing in the Parish Hall outside store.

Archiving Peter Hales wanted to know what the policy was for archiving. Helen said that there were many documents that needed to be stored. However, it was agreed at some point over the early summer that Helen and Linda would have good look to see what could be shredded. PH was going to talk to Penny about having garage space and hall space made available. GC said that Citizen Advice potentially were going to get rid of filling cabinets which would be suitable for storing documents. GC said he would check with CA and report back re the cabinets. Storing of documents: - Helen said 'Legal Topic Note 40' there were lots of different aspects that need to be adhered to.

#### **Road Safety**

a) **Totnes Road Recycle Containers**. KG reported there is currently only one recycle container on the Totnes Road for bottles. The paper container has been removed. She felt that the two banks were causing road safety issues. It is not known if the removal of the paper bank is permanent. PH will try and find out officially what the intention is and if this is permanent.

PH wanted clarification of what needs to be kept and the PC needs a policy for archiving.

b) The new speed sign is to be commissioned asap

#### Warm Space Initiative

The PC noted that the Warm Spaces initiative meeting in the Village Hall had been discontinued due to lack of attendance.

- 15) CLERKS REPORT None new clerk only just appointed
- 16) CHAIRMANS REPORT previously circulated: Matters arising:

The Stagecoach 93 bus service is coming to a halt in September after Stagecoach indicated that they would give up the contract. This is a big concern for the community as it used by many residents in many parishes along the route who have no other means of transport. The new PC will need to work with other Parishes keep pressure on Devon County Council to ensure that the service is retained and retendered so that another operator can be appointed.

Note To All Councillors your Expenditure Report must be completed for the next meeting in May please bring your completed signed hard copy to the PCM – thanks.

#### 17) Councillors Reports – Previously circulated: Matters arising:

PH asked if DR was still happy to look after the defibrillator even though he is standing down as a councillor. DR confirmed that he would - the 4-year maintenance contract is up in Oct 23 and will need to be renewed. DR confirmed the price will remain the same. On Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> October at 6.30pm defibrillator training for the public will be available in the Village Hall.

GC A village resident had asked if she could plant three flowering cherry trees on the rough piece of land on the Village Green (the piece at the bottom of the field). GC had informed her that the PC would look at the covenant which governs the lease of the land from DCC, but that the conditions were very stringent and new planting was unlikely to meet the terms.

**18) NEXT MEETING:** Thursday May 18<sup>th</sup> at 7.00pm at Strete Parish Hall. The first half hour of the meeting will be taken up with administration relating to the new Council. The main Parish meeting should get underway at about 7.30pm

#### **River Gara Water Vole Reintroduction Project UPDATE**

A group of villagers from the Blackawton area have set out to reintroduce water voles to our local river. With more than 90% of Britain's water voles extinct due to habitat loss and predation by escaped American mink, they are a very rare sight these days. The group's first investigations suggested that the River Gara, which rises in Blackawton and



then flows through Strete and Slapton parishes, was an ideal habitat with lots of the vegetation rich banks that voles love. Discussions with landowners along the Gara showed strong support for the idea and so that left one big unanswered question – were there any American mink still in the valley? A single mink can wipe out an entire vole colony in a very short time. Five mink traps have now been positioned along the length of the Gara for the last four months and not a single mink has appeared and this finally gave the group the green light for the project.

Water voles are a keystone species, meaning that they have a disproportionately positive effect on their envi-

ronment relative to their numbers. By nibbling vegetation alongside the river, water voles create flower rich banks with a lot of plant diversity which benefits bees, moths, butterflies and other pollinators and also the mammals, birds and bats that then feed on those insects. Water voles themselves are food for a wide range of animals including herons, otters, stoats, pike and owls.

The other key to the project succeeding was enlisting the help of a water vole expert. After visiting a West Devon farmer and naturalist by the name of Derek Gow, and seeing his water vole rich ponds, the group knew they'd found their man. He came and walked the Gara and confirmed that not only was the river perfect water vole habitat but pointed out that they would soon spread down into Slapton Ley. Having done other water vole reintroductions before Derek was very clear that the only way to establish a viable and genetically diverse population was to have at least four introduction sites and release, over two years, a total of 800 voles.

Such a comprehensive long-term project doesn't come cheap but a combination of local donations, some generous support from Strete Parish Council and a 'Farming in Protected Landscapes' grant has enabled the group to get the project going and Derek Gow has now got busy breeding the first 200 voles that will be needed for the initial release in July. They will be carefully monitored and then followed by three further introductions over the next two years. Before too long you should be able to spot their little bankside meadows and entrance holes in the bank and hear that plop as they jump in the water at your approach.
