80th ANNIVERSARY MEMORIAL SERVICE

Anniversary memorial service will be held on Sunday April 28th at 2pm at the Sherman Tank memorial, conducted by the Royal Tank Regiment Association, Plymouth Branch. During the Exercise Tiger, 749 servicemen were killed, while only 197 died during the actual landing on Utah Beach. Though many lost their lives in the exercise, it also prevented the possible bigger loss at the actual landing.



Exercise Tiger 0630 on the 27th of April 1944

Altered timings, bad communications and live ammunition resulted in 110 deaths.

Dedication of a memorial to the loss of 110 US personnel Strete Gate Car Park at 2pm on 5th April 2024

The parish council was made aware of an unreported event involving Exercise Tiger at the meeting in February. This is a summary of those events from Mr Teddy Cranmer.

Over four years of research concerning the early and unreported part of Exercise Tiger the following salient facts apply.

US troops made their first landing at 0630 on the 27th of April 1944. They came ashore from LSTs/Higgins boats on' red ' beach near the middle/end of the Ley, near Strete Gate. It was a shambles - Altered timings, bad communications, live ammunition unbeknown to defenders and those coming ashore and bombardment from a cruiser and destroyers lying off-shore coinciding with the landing.

110 deaths - but, due to D-Day five weeks away, these became swallowed up in the great deception that surrounded Tiger.

It would also have had a disastrous effect on morale, both US forces preparing for D-Day and for their families back in the USA.

There has never been a memorial to these 110 (bodies and identities were carefully spirited away) but there were witnesses and Ike noted these losses.

Mr Cranmer has obtained permission from Brendan Spokes of Strete Estate to place a memorial at Strete Gate.

As result of his dedication to acknowledge this tragedy you are invited to the unveiling of a memorial cairn commemorating the loss of over 100 US personnel during the first Tiger landing on Slapton Sands 27/04/1944.

This will take place in Strete Gate Car Park at 2pm on 5th April 2024.

Unveiling of the memorial will be by Anthony Mangnall MP followed by tea at the Field Studies Centre, Slapton.

MINUTES OF STRETE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 18 JANUARY 2024

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE:

There were no apologies for absence

DISTRICT COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

SHDC have now rolled out a single waste system across the district, where previously there were four systems running at the same time, which was expensive to operate. District Council will start looking at further innovation in future.

SHDC budget (to be ratified at the February meeting, is looking to be a 2.99% increase (£55 per average household). There are no big black holes in the SHDC budget for 24/25.

On 25th January the first part of the Delivery Plan with costings will be released. This is planned to be a living, dynamic, evolving document. SHDC is looking to be a bottom-up administration where District Councils will look to Parish Councils to say where they are going right/wrong. Members of the public encouraged to ask questions.

Freeport, item on agenda in December. JB advised that many in the council were very concerned, and the Audit and Governance Committee had reviewed the proposal and produced a report to mitigate some of the concerns reported. They have been asked for regular updates and if at any stage it is not a good deal for the taxpayer the Council will pull out. Council took view that the Freeport was going ahead and wanted to stay within the partnership to best maintain influence.

The Chairman asked if Councillors are aware that in the newly released Planning Platform, Parishes are unable to upload comments. JB advised that a plan is being devised to provide training to councillors and clerks on the new planning system.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT

County is in the middle of the budget setting process for 24/25. An increase of 4.99% is expected, to be confirmed at budget setting meeting in February. 2% of that will be ring-fenced for adult social care. The Council is currently carrying a £4.5m overspend forecast (month 8), but in JB's experience this will be balanced by the end of the financial year. Biggest concern is SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) overspend which is a total of £65m. DCC is budgeting to overspend by over £37m next year in this area. Government have announced this can be kept off the budget sheet, until March 2026 to sort out. Criteria for government writing off overspend is to have a plan in place to not overspend in future, which DCC are formulating. JB will share future updates. Councillors queried how (other than by receiving more funding) the council can expect to save that amount of money, without impacting already stretched services. JB stated that it is no secret Devon has been failing in children's services for over ten years and there is a lack of in-county provision for children. There is a protest at county hall on 8th February with a group of parents who feel let down by the County. JB also pointed out that people hear about the poor service in Devon and do not want to work here. Reliance on agency workers is causing a cycle of failure in the sector.

The Devolution deal on the table proposes a collaboration between Devon CC, and Torbay Council linked with the District Councils in the area to form a new level of local Government to interface directly with Central Government, dealing with strategic local issues and funding. Full details have

been published on-line. An extraordinary meeting of County cabinet will take place on 2 February and a public consultation is expected to follow. The Minister has made clear that while District Councils do not have voting rights on the deal, consultation is expected. It is another tier of local government, but JB did not know governance structure, benefits or running costs.

Councillors queried that DCC had landed huge amount of money for road repairs from the cancellation of the HS2 rail project. JB confirmed a one-off capital fund of £6.6 million had been allocated and that a large amount was to be spent on Wallingford Road, Kingsbridge and in Thurlestone. Councillors pointed out huge amount of damage to vehicle tyres due to potholes and that roadworkers are repairing one pot hole and ignoring those around it when it would make more sense to repair all of the pot holes in the vicinity while they have the equipment and materials on site. JB advised DCC do not have the capacity to deal with potholes in-house and are reliant on agency workers, who only do the job as specified. JB is looking at working with the companies to improve process. JB is going to find out why potholes in Strete are being circled but not being fixed. **OPEN PUBLIC FORUM** : Members of the public were present at the meeting.

Strete Parish Council Chairman's report – January 2024 Peter Hales

Bus Services and Road Closures

Severe disruption to the 93 service through the village is being caused by the road closures of the A379 at Stoke Fleming and Modbury. Disruption is expected to continue until the end of March. The bus detour around the main street at Modbury inserts an extra 40 minutes into the normal journey time from Plymouth to Kingsbridge, which has a knock-on effect on onward services from Kingsbridge to Dartmouth. The service from Kingsbridge diverts at Strete up the Totnes Road and then turns right onto the A3122 at Oldstone to reach Dartmouth. The reverse journeys from Dartmouth to Kingsbridge take the same route and a shuttle service is provided between Dartmouth and Stoke Fleming. A special temporary timetable is in operation, and details of revised bus timings are available via a link on the Parish website or from the shop, who have some paper copies. Residents using the Totnes Road to avoid the work at Stoke Flaming (recommended) will have noticed a substantial increase in traffic requiring even more patience than normal to navigate the narrow parts, and the additional hazard of buses in both directions. The good news amidst all this adversity is that the freeze on the price of a single bus ticket at £2.00 has now been extended until the end of December 2024 with additional Central Government support. Devon CC runs an Enhanced Partnership scheme with all bus operators in Devon, and the quarterly Board minutes are published for public consumption. Much of the attention is focussed upon Exeter, however the following two items may be of interest from the 18th October 23 meeting minutes: - In partnership with DCC, Stagecoach will be putting in a bid for ZEBRA2 (Zero Emission Bus Rural Areas) funding. This does require significant capital investment by Stagecoach. Details will follow as to which areas and routes this will include. -

Stagecoach have seen a 4.6% increase in passenger growth over the last 6 months coupled with a 1.6% increase in bus service operating miles on the Stagecoach network. Let's hope the business case is bright enough to support zero emissions on the 93 service!

New Parish Laptop Computer

In the last month the Parish has invested in a new laptop computer and software for the exclusive use of the Parish Clerk on Council business. The new equipment replaces the present machine which is about 12 years old and beyond practical use. It is the intention that the old equipment will be recycled.

SHDC Draft Corporate Strategy

'The Council Plan' SHDC tabled a Draft Corporate Strategy document in the Autumn for public consultation. The document set out the direction that the new leadership intends to take and proposed a number of significant policies to do with social housing (or the lack of it), the environment and community support. The Parish Council reviewed the document and made a number of comments, mostly regarding ambitions surrounding targets. From the SHDC Executive meeting on 30th November, we know that the Strategy has been updated and renamed as 'The Council Plan' 2024 – 2028. The Executive approved the document and the proposal is to present it to the Full Council for endorsement and adoption as policy at the Full Council meeting scheduled for 15th February. A copy of the document may be obtained by residents on request from the Parish Clerk.

South Hams Green Hydrogen and the Freeport at Langage

Residents may be aware that SHDC is participating in the designated Freeport area at Langage, but the Executive has been carrying out risk assessment work to determine if it should continue. The development includes the Carlton Energy Green Hydrogen project that I outlined here in December. At the SHDC Executive Meeting in November, an analytical risk report was presented and endorsed, which made 17 proposals essentially recommending that the Council should take but also that the Council should remain fully invested in the scheme, The report then went to the Full Council on 14th December, where Julian Brazil tells me it was adopted "These (17 proposals) are to mitigate the undoubted risk and also bring accountability and responsibility under democratic control."

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Water Vole Update



After 200 water voles were released into the Gara last September near Hutcherleigh and Millcombe we were pleased to see the results of a survey showing that they had settled in well with plenty of signs of vole activity.

Keen eyed locals have spotted water voles as far north as Ritson and near Forder which is a kilometre or so south of the release sites. It is possible that they have already reached as far as Slapton Ley.

However these adventurous voles need to find breeding partners on their travels to make the reintroduction sustainable in the long term and so we will be releasing

the next 200 further south along the Gara in early June.

A new map based on aerial laser scanning of England's landscape using Lidar (Light Detection and Ranging) has revealed that there is a total of 390,000km of hedges in England, measuring between one and six metres in height. Additionally, there are another 67,000 km of lower hedges and a further 185,000 km of overgrown hedges above 6m tall. It is estimated that 40% of UK hedges (95,000 miles) are ancient and species rich.


The South West boasts the most hedgerows with about 33,000 miles (53,000 km) of hedge in Devon, more than any other county, though this is not all of Devon hedgebank construction. This is because the traditional farming throughout the county has meant that fewer hedges in Devon have been removed than in other counties. A quarter of Devon's hedges are now thought to be over 800 years old. Some Devon hedges represent ancient boundaries, most likely of early Saxon estates (c. 650–700 A.D.) Ordnance Survey maps reveal a remarkable correlation between the lengths of hedged field boundaries, and multiples of a chain (22 yards, or about 20m). The most common length is 220 yards, or one furlong, i.e. one 'furrow long'.

A formula developed for dating hedges based on the number of tree and shrub species, known as the 'Hooper formula', is based around the number of tree and shrub species in a 30 metre length of hedge can indicate its age, with one species for each 100 years. A single species hedge is likely to be less than 100 years old whilst a 1,000-year-old hedge is likely to contain ten to twelve species. **Age =(no of species in a 30 yard stretch) x 110 + 30 years**. Several 30 metre stretches should be counted in each hedgerow. The average number of species equates to the age in centuries. It is advisable not to start counting close to the start of a hedge where anomalous species may occur and only established hedge plants are counted, not seedlings.

Devon's hedges are a particularly important wildlife habitat. Around 20% of the UK's species-rich hedges occur within Devon. Over 600 flowering plants, 1500 insects, 65 birds and 20 mammals have been recorded living or feeding in Devon hedges. If you're not sure which trees and shrubs are already present in a hedge, PTES has put together a handy hedgerow tree and shrub species ID guide which can be found at: https://peoplestrust.wpenginepowered.com/wp-content




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
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

Vegan Tiffin

Ingredients

75g coconut oil, plus extra for the tin 200g vegan dark chocolate (at least

70%), roughly chopped2 tbsp golden syrup200g vegan ginger nuts100g dried cranberries



50g pistachios, toasted and chopped

Method

- 1. Lightly oil a 20cm square brownie tin with coconut oil and line the base with baking parchment. Melt the chocolate with the coconut oil and golden syrup in the microwave in 30-second bursts until smooth and glossy.
- 2. Break the ginger nuts into small pieces in a bowl, then add the dried cranberries and pistachios. Scrape in the chocolate mixture and give everything a good mix to combine, then spoon the tiffin into the tin. Use the back of the spoon to smooth out the top and press it down, then chill in the fridge for 2 hours or until set hard. Once set, cut into 25 mini squares. Will keep for a week in the fridge



Box Breathing

One simple deep breathing technique is known as Box Breathing. It's named this due to the exercise's four steps which make a box shape.

Take a moment to relax your shoulders, release any tension in your jaw and let your body settle. Then follow the steps below.

She fondly reminisced that all the knitting patterns were tested on site by experienced knitters and the resulting garments were sold off to the office girls.

As discussion swirled, it was clear that spinning and knitting were not confined to dusty archives or museums - they pulse within our memories! We all left richer for sharing them, and for a newfound appreciation of the timeless art of spinning.


He was thanked by Joan who said they were hoping he had more talks to give us.

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The RNLI's 200th year of lifesaving

It was Sir William Hillary's vision for a service dedicated to saving lives at sea became a reality in Bishopsgate's City of London Tavern on 4 March 1824. Over 30 eminent gentlemen put their names to the fledgling RNLI at the inaugural public meeting.

The meeting unanimously passed 12 resolutions, including:

That an Institution can now be formed to be supported by donations and annual subscriptions.



- That such immediate assistance be afforded to persons rescued as their necessities may require.
- That the subjects of all nations be equally objects of the Institution, as well in war as in peace [and] that medallions or pecuniary rewards be given to those who rescue lives.

Little did they know that these 12 resolutions would still stand as part of the RNLI's charter almost 200 years later.

Your RNLI: 200 years and counting

Dart RNLI is one of the busiest lifeboat stations in Devon, on call to emergencies in the Dart Estuary all the way up to Totnes and out to sea. Facing fast-moving water, constant traffic on the river, a tidal estuary, and coastal conditions like swell and exposure to the elements, the lifeboat crew respond to all kinds of rescues.

An appeal was launched last year 2022 to raise £1.2m to convert Ferry View House, the original lifeboat station in the 1800s, into a purpose-built station with modern facilities for Dart RNLI's volunteer crews. It is hoped building work will begin in spring 2024, the same year the RNLI celebrates its 200th birthday. The current lifeboat station in Coronation Park is a temporary building at the end of its lease, so to continue saving lives, the crew need to relocate to a permanent, purpose-built station, with suitable facilities for the lifesaving volunteers.

Slapton Line Partnership – Report from Peter Hales

A meeting of the Slapton Line Partnership took place on Friday 9th March at Follaton House and was attended by Strete Parish Councillors.

The meeting was chaired by Anthony Mangnall MP in his role as interim Chairman.

Official minutes of the meeting are not yet published, but a part of the discussion centred around DCC Highways proposals for improving back routes so that residents in affected Parishes would have adequate access in the event of the road over Slapton Line being breached. Prior to the meeting DCC had circulated a proposal for comment which included designation of a back route to Slapton and Stokenham via Gara Mill. Proposed improvements largely included the provision of additional passing places.

Strete PC made it clear before the meeting that the road through Gara Mill would never be an appropriate or viable proposition for a back route due to its narrowness, steepness and the inherent limitations and alignment of the bridge itself.

It is believed that Stokenham and Slapton PCs had made similar comments, with Stokenham suggesting a route further north, which would include part of Totnes Road to Oldstone.

Strete PC suggested that public money would be better spent upon making improvements along the length of Totnes Road to Oldstone where it joins the A3122, which would give a more viable back route for Stoke Fleming and Slapton residents assuming the A379 was breached south of the Slapton Beach turning (which the vulnerability study now suggests is more likely than the northern leg)

During the meeting Highways accepted that the Gara Mill route was a non-starter and promised to provide updated proposals to the Parishes.

The PC hopes to be able to have these proposals in time to explain them to residents at the Annual Parish Meeting on 18th April.

Your PC and the other affected Parishes have continued to press for immediate action on road improvements, rather than waiting until a breach occurs.

Regarding proposals to reinforce the sea defences to protect

Slapton Line and the road over it in line with the revised management strategy, I am afraid that progress is still extremely slow.

SHDC has engaged a consultant with a scope of work which is aimed at delivering outline proposals by the end of the year, as a pre-cursor to seeking planning consent.

This is an uphill struggle to see positive action.





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
